OKEMAH, Okla. (AP)—A 4-year-old boy, crippled and a deaf mute, was found early today whimpering on a creek bank after wandering away from his father 10 hours earlier.

Nearly 400 volunteers, including a National Guard unit from Okemah, had been searching with bloodhounds for the youngster, Larry Walker. They had feared he might have fallen into the deep Fork River and drowned.

His father, Parr Walker, and two volunteers came upon him 1 1/2 miles from the spot where he disappeared yesterday while his father was picking pecans.

He was reported in good condition and was taken home.

Stewart Lennox Baptist Pastor Moves to Drain

The Rev. T. T. Smith has accepted the pastorate of the First Baptist Church of Drain. He announced his resignation from the Stewart Lennox Southern Baptist Church earlier this week.

During the 20 months the Rev. Smith was pastor of the local church, he saw the membership increase 35 persons, went through a fire and subsequent building program.

In October of last year, the old church structure burned, but services were held in the new addition, then under construction and now completed.

The church is located in the Emerald Street between Greenpines Drive and Highway 66.
