Webfoots Could Tie Beavers

Ducks Win In Two Overtimes

The Coast Conference Northern Division basketball chase comes to an end Saturday night, for all intents and purposes, and the finale would do justice to a Hollywood whodunit writer.

The Oregon State Beavers, leading the loop with a 10-5 record, bump into arch-rival Oregon, in second place at 9-6, in the season's windup for both squads at Corvallis, home of the Beavers.

An Oregon State win would send the Beavers against the Southern Division champs, as yet undecided for the conference crown and a berth in the Western Regional of the NCAA playoffs at Corvallis the second weekend of March.

BLEW
The Beavers blew a chance to take the title Friday night as they dropped a 63-60 decision to the Ducks at Eugene in two overtimes. A win for Oregon Saturday night would throw OSG and Oregon into a tie for the top spot.

In the only other Northern Division action Friday night, Idaho clinched third place in the loop by dropping the Washington Huskies, 74-66. The Huskies hold down fourth place at 5-8. Idaho is third with an 8-7 mark and Washington State, idle Friday night, is the last end club with a 4-10 mark.

CLOSES
Idaho closes out its season Saturday night in the second game of its series with the Huskies. Washington ends its season next Friday and Saturday by hosting Washington State at Seattle.

The double overtime thriller at Eugene was decided when Barney Holland, connected on a toughie from the side to give the Ducks a 60-58 lead and they held on the rest of the way.

The regulation game ended with the score at 51-41. The first overtime period ended with the score tied at 56-56. Ed Halberg drew first blood in the second overtime with a two-pointer for Oregon with 1:15 minutes gone.

A field goal by OSC's Jay Dean again tied the score, the 10th time of the game. Holland followed with his tie-breaker and the Ducks won 63-60.

TOP SCORER
Halberg led scoring for the winners with 17 points. Oregon State's Swede Halberg was the game's top point-getter with 28 counters.

The Washington-Idaho contest at Moscow was a well-played game all the way. The first quarter was close all the way and it ended in a 16-16 tie.

The Huskies started fast in the second period, with Don Tripp's field goal and Dean Parson's charity loss giving them their first, and only lead, of the game, at 19-16.

Idaho bounced right back, however, and took charge to lead at the intermission, 38-29. The Vandals pulled away steadily in the third period but had to weather a 23-point Washington spurge in the final period.

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Cincinnati Upsets Duquesne

NEW YORK (AP) — Duquesne walked into an ambush just four steps from home and today was just another member of the pack that almost—but not quite—made college basketball history.

Records only have been keeping since they have been able to go through an entire season undefeated. But with 22 victories and only four to go before last night's game with Cincinnati, the Ducks, No. 1 team in the nation, were as good a bet as any to get by unscathed.

But Cincinnati, a so-so outfit that could lick the little fellows, hung a solid 68-52 defeat on the Ducks

to leave only Kentucky among the nation's major unbeaten teams. The Wildcats have won 22, play Auburn tonight and finish operations against Alabama Monday.

NOT CLOSE
Cincinnati's triumph over Duquesne wasn't even close. The Ducks trailed all the way and were completely at the mercy of Cincinnati's possession game. Earlier this season, Duquesne had beaten George Smith's lads by 20 points.

The Ducks play Dayton, another tough customer, tonight.

Meanwhile, Frank Selvy of Furman shattered the last big college scoring record when he dropped in

eight free throws as his club whipped Davidson 105-91. Now he has 335 free throws surpassing the record of 332 set by Johnny O'Brien of Seattle last year.

With Furman having played its last regular season game, Selvy has the following to his credit: in addition to the foul shooting:

Oklahoma A and M, the fifth ranking team in the Associated Press weekly poll, also was the victim of an upset. Kansas stopped the Argies, 66-55.

The Southwest Conference race will go right down to the end. Both Texas and Rice won last night to stay in a tie for first place. The Longhorns defeated Arkansas 67-57 and the Owls beat off Texas Christian 72-69. Each has one game to play, Texas against Texas Christian and Rice against Southern Methodist.

TITLE
Colorado A and M, won its first skyline championship in history by defeating Utah 70-66 and thus filled another berth in the NCAA post-season tournament.

In the Ivy League Cornell extended its first place margin with a 69-53 triumph over Brown. The Big Red now has an 8-2 mark while Penn and Princeton are tied for second, each with 8-3.

In the Big Ten the heat will be on Indiana, the leader. If the Hoosiers lose to Ohio State and Iowa locks Michigan State, a tie for first place would ensue. If the Hoosiers win, however, they can do no worse than tie for the championship at the end.

The Border Conference title also could be decided. Texas Tech, idle, will win it if Hardin-Simmons beats West Texas State.

In other major games last night, Oklahoma City halted Drake 55-50, Duke outscored Wake Forest 90-81, Eastern Kentucky beat Middle Tennessee 95-69, Western Kentucky slugged Moorehead 97-79 and Southern Methodist romped over Baylor 90-66.

Prairie City still is unbeaten in the sub-district 7-B tournament, after downing Mt. Vernon 60-57. Spray bested Daytonville 56-56 and Long Creek edged Metumun 46-36. The tourney continues Saturday night.

In the Douglas County sub-district 4-B tournament, Yoncalla beat Canyonville 41-33 and Elkton downed Riddle 42-38.

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Newport Five Upends Corvallis, 47 to 36

Races for district titles advanced another lap in Friday night's Oregon high school basketball action, with the state tournament opening March 15 at Eugene the final goal.

The only major upset was Newport's 47-36 victory over Corvallis, the No. 2 team in the Associated Press poll.

Baker advanced to a playoff for the district 1 championship by downing La Grande 58-55. Baker now meets Ontario in a best two-of-three playoff for the district title.

In district 5, Roseburg downed Glendale 65-46 and Myrtle Creek beat Sutherlin 30-21. Myrtle Creek now plays Drain Saturday night for the sub-district title. North Bend took a semi-final sub-district 5 win over Bandon, 75-60, in the western division and meets Marshfield in a title game Saturday night.

PLAYOFF
Oakridge bested Junction City 66-44, and now meets Cottage Grove in a Saturday night playoff for the final district 6 tournament berth.

Eugene, Willamette of Eugene and Creswell already are in the tourney. Willamette beat Cottage Grove 79-66 Friday night.

Dallas downed Salem Academy 78-57 and Central of Monmouth Independence nosed out Sheridan 54-43 in the district 8 tournament at McMinnville. Dallas now meets Central next Friday in the semifinals of the single elimination tourney.

FAVORITE
Beaverton still is the favorite in the district 9 tournament, after

downing Tigard 51-36 Friday night. Hillsboro bounced back from an earlier defeat to eliminate Sherwood 58-35, and Forest Grove stayed in the race with a 68-45 decision over Banks.

In district 10 tournament action, Astoria beat Warrenton 57-44 and Seaside downed Tillamook 54-51.

Favored Salem opened the district 11 tournament with a 51-36 victory over Sacred Heart of Salem. Stayton beat Cascade in the other game. Saturday night Silverton plays Woodburn and Mt. Angel meets North Marion.

Milwaukie, rated No. 1 in the AP poll, closed its regular season with a 61-50 nondistrict win over Central Catholic of Portland. Milwaukie has lost only one game this season.

FOR SECOND
The race for second place in the Portland league was thrown into a three-way tie among Benson, Cleveland and Lincoln. Grant dumped Benson 49-47, Cleveland beat Washington 78-75 and Lincoln stopped Jefferson 67-47. Roosevelt, which already has won the city title and a state tourney berth, defeated Franklin 58-53. Portland's other tournament spot goes to the runner-up team.

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
