Disney Competes Against Himself For Oscar Award

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—You think you've got problems? Walt Disney finds he is competing against himself in two academy divisions.

The wizard of Burbank faces his biggest year in the Oscar derby. He is up for six different productions, an amazing number for an independent producer. But his joy is somewhat tempered by the fact that his films have to fight each other as well as the rest of the nominees.

Disney has two entries in the one-reel cartoon class—"Toot, Whistle, Plunk and Boom" and "The Rugged Bear." In two-reel shorts, his "Ben and Me" is up against "Bear Country." Wee is Walt.

The nominations show how Disney has branched out from his original business of grinding out Mickey Mouse shorts. "The Living Desert" is up for the feature-length documentary award, is his first feature in the true-life adventure series. "The Alaskan Eskimo," nominated for the best documentary short, is his first venture in a companion series called People and Places.

"Ben and Me" is Disney's first 20-minute short and "Toot, etc." is his first cartoon in cinemascope.

His major 1954 effort, "Peter Pan," isn't up for an Oscar since cartoon features have no niche in the voting setup. However, Walt isn't worrying. It has already won the movie goers' award of seven million dollars in domestic gross, according to Variety.

"The Robe" may rank as the top moneymaker of all time when the returns are totaled up, but it had been something less than an artistic triumph. Witness the fact that it garnered only five Oscar nominations to "From Here to Eternity's" 13.

This may be the reason: The script was written for Gregory Peck. The studio long hoped for Peck to play Marcellus and expected him to. But he had gone to Europe to cash in on the 18-month tax deal. The studio wouldn't give up hope.

Lacking a final turnout from Peck, it continued to have the script rewritten to fit his talents. As a result, the role of Demetrius, so important in the book, became subordinate.

Finally, Peck decided in favor of the income tax deal and declined to return to Hollywood for "The Robe." The studio had an investment of millions of dollars as well as staking its whole future on the new cinemascope process. So the promising young actor Richard Burton was assigned to the Peck role.

Although both are accomplished, Peck and Burton are two different actors. The script didn't fit Burton.

Chicago Beef Prices Steady

CHICAGO (AP)—Barrows and gilts eased around 25 cents while sows sold 25 to 50 cents higher on the hog market this week.

Large local papers took an increased proportion of the hog run this week but trading was rather dull on most sessions. Receipts consisted largely of butcher hogs scaling 210 to 280 pounds and a slight increase in light weight, new crop late summer pigs.

At the week's close top stood at \$26.40, down 25 cents from the previous week end but up 30 cents from midweek.

Choice and prime steers sold steady to 50 cents higher but all other grades of steers, as well as all heifers, ended the week steady to 50 cents down. Top for the week was \$30.50 for five loads of 1,105 to 1,222 pound prime steers.

Receipts in the cattle section this week were about in line with last week but fully 10 per cent larger than a year ago.

Slaughter lambs reached the highest prices since August on gains of \$1.00 to \$1.25 for the week. Curtailed receipts locally and at the main terminals across the country stimulated the week's lamb trade, but relatively broad shipping demand was also a bullish factor.

A \$24.00 top was paid during the week for mostly prime 90 pound woolled lambs.

Poisoned Food Served In School

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP)—The Polk County Health Department today began an investigation of poisoned food that sent at least 60 school teachers and children to hospitals.

Capt. John F. Tolson of the Lakeland police said preliminary investigation by medical authorities indicated potato salad served to about 225 children at the cafeteria of the Griffin School, northwest of Lakeland, was responsible.
