

Uptrend Seen In Job Lists

Solid evidence of an early uptrend from Oregon's wintertime employment low came this week in reports of callbacks to seasonal work in many sections of the state, and in reduced claim lines in local offices. Non-farm jobs, estimated at around 430,000 late in January and early this month, were about at the 1952 level and down 10,000 from comparable 1953 figures, according to information released by the State Unemployment Compensation Commission.

PORTLAND (AP)—The Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics reported Friday that Portland living costs in January were up compared with the same month a year ago. But at 115.4, the price index was at its lowest level since last April. The January, 1953, index was 114.7. Food prices increased 1 per cent last month but housing, apparel and transportation costs brought the average down slightly.
