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Soroptimist Members Learn Of Local Juvenile Problems From Juvenile Officer Mathews

The problem of juvenile delinquency in Klamath County was brought sharply to the attention of members of the Soroptimist Club following Thursday's luncheon at the Williams Hotel.

Francis Mathews, Klamath County juvenile officer, introduced by Olive Williams, program chairman, outlined the handling of juvenile cases, phases of delinquency, the definition of a juvenile, the laws governing cases, effectiveness, and cases handled.

Present need is for an expanded personnel, Mathews told his audience. At present he and an assistant are handling the work. Last year, 500 children were involved in 700 cases in Klamath County. An effort is also being made to organize a citizen committee to help with the problems . . . a plan that has been successful in other parts of the country.

There are only three juvenile homes in Oregon, one each in Multnomah, Lane and Klamath Counties. One is planned for Jackson County in the future. The local home has been outgrown, Mathews stated, and present handling of cases on divided floors is difficult.

The "Woman of the Year" banquet is to be held March 24 at the Williams Hotel when the achievement award will be presented to the local woman who has rendered the greatest service toward the economic advancement of women and aid to youth in the community over a period of years. A member of the club is not eligible.

A similar award, made by the Quins Club this week, went to a member of the Soroptimist Club, Ellen Clark, who was recognized at Thursday's meeting. Mrs. Clark was presented with an arrangement of pansy-willows and red tulips by Kathleen Thompson.

The Soroptimist award was instituted the year Mrs. Thompson was president in 1935.

It was also announced that the annual book sale to raise funds for

the Soroptimist Club will be held at the March 4 meeting in the Williams Hotel.
