CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—Delegates to the 10th Inter-American Conference took a carnival holiday this Shrove Tuesday after an opening session which cheered an attack on communism.

Woman Rescued Off San Diego

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—A French ship last night rescued a woman who had fought for five days alone against the sea in a leaking sailboat.

Mrs. Vera Olive Rideout, 46, who had set out from San Pedro Feb. 20 on an attempt to sail around the world, was picked up about 15 miles south of San Diego by the French training vessel Maurice Christmas. She was transferred to a Coast Guard cutter, returned here and hospitalized for treatment of a dislocated spinal disc.

Her 25-foot sailboat sprang a leak off Guadalupe Island south of here. "Then I threw my back out when the mizzen boom hit me," she told newsmen.

"I planned to leave to off the island for two or three weeks until my back got better. But I woke up with the water 10 inches above the floorboards in the cabin.

"I began pumping every 15 minutes and then had to make it every 10. I decided to try to make San Diego before she sank."

Several ships passed within sight, she said, but she was unable to attract their attention.

Penalty Suggested For Drunk Drivers

JACKSON, Miss. (AP)—Public ridicule is offered by the Mississippi House as a curb to drunken driving.

The House voted 82-22 yesterday for a bill that would require a convicted drunken driver to work at least one day on the jail grounds during daylight hours. The bill was held up on a routine motion to reconsider, but the overwhelmingly favorable vote indicated final approval.

The measure provides a mandatory five-day jail sentence as minimum punishment with one year the maximum. The violator could also be fined \$100 to \$1,000 and have his driver's license revoked.

The Mystick Krewe of Comus, oldest of all Mardi Gras organizations, is slated to take over tonight.

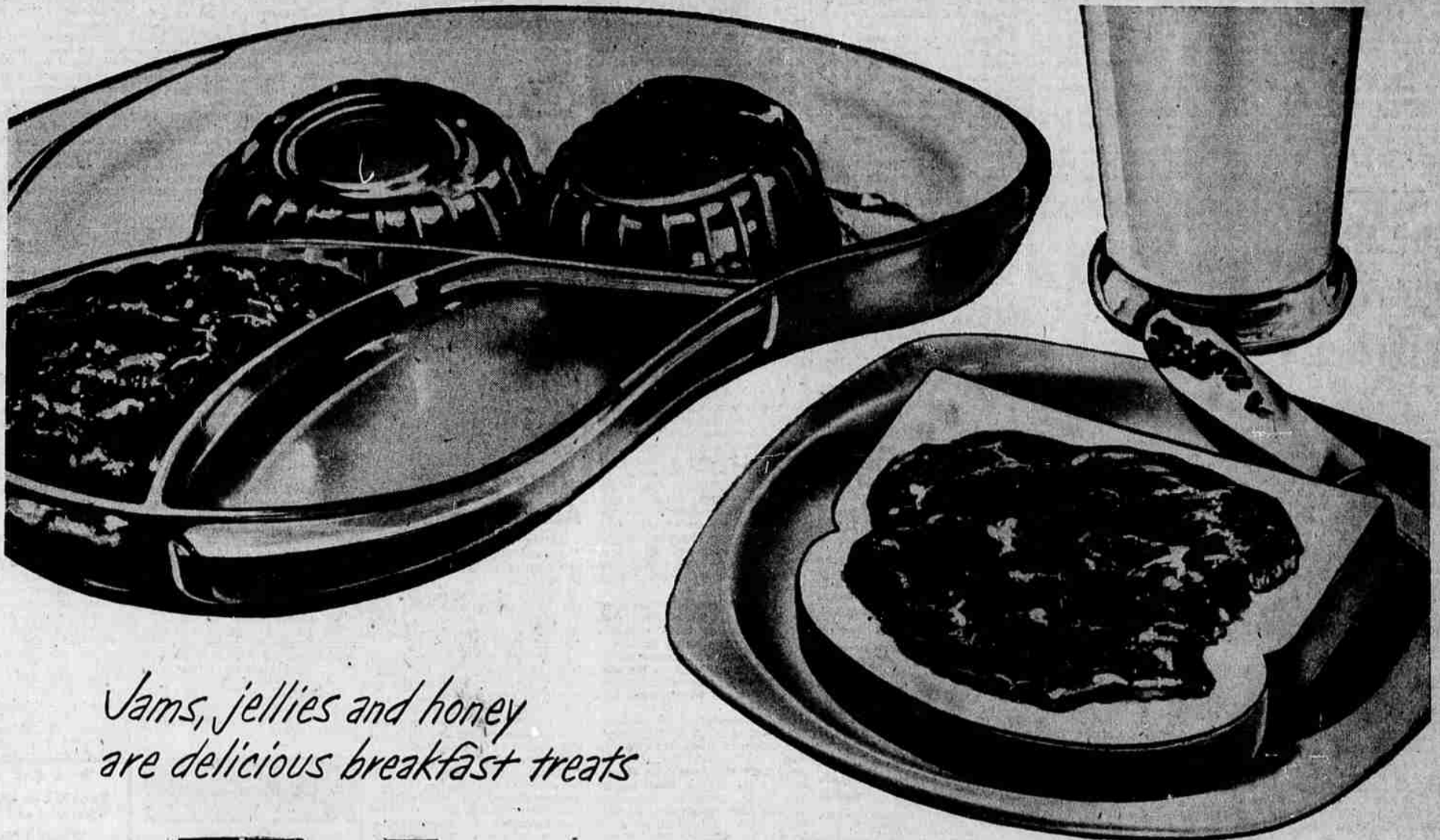

only about an hour after a group of Puerto Rican Nationalists shot and wounded five members of the U. S. House of Representatives in Washington. One of the Puerto Ricans told police they timed their attack in

an attempt to influence opinion at the conference against the United States, which has granted Puerto Rico commonwealth status and offered it full independence whenever the islanders want it. Secretary of state Dulles issued

a statement saying he was "deeply shocked." Arturo Morales Carrión, Puerto Rican undersecretary of state and a member of the U. S. delegation, expressed distress and said "I think it was an act of sheer lunacy."
