Van Mollison, president of the Peterson School Parents and Patrons Association announced Wednesday that the organization on March 10 will sponsor a panel discussion of the South Suburban sanitation problem.

Participating in the symposium will be Dr. Beth Kerron, Klamath County health officer; George Dagg, Klamath County Health Department sanitarian, and Ted Geovon of Grants Pass, Southwest Oregon district sanitary engineer.

Dr. Kerron will outline the history of the suburban problem. Dagg will stress the hazard to public health in the area under present conditions.

Geovon will offer a possible solution to the problem and will explain methods of financing of a sanitation project.

Mollison said the discussion will open at 7:30 p.m. in the Peterson School. The public is invited. More than 10,000 persons reside in that area.
