NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market advanced Thursday with the railroads and oils providing the inspiration for the rise. Prices went from around a point lower to between 1 and 2 points higher with some issues moving much more widely on their own.

Volume dwindled to an estimated 1,800,000 shares as compared with 2,240,000 shares traded Wednesday when the market was irregular.

CHICAGO (AP)—Although receipts of hogs fell below expectations Thursday the market was not able to develop any real strength. Buyers paid \$25.50 to \$26.85 for most choice 180 to 250 pound butchers and went up to \$26.00 to \$26.25, the top.

Steers and heifers were only steady to 50 cents lower, in some cases losing as much as \$1.00 on steers. Top was \$27.50 for a load of prime 1,416 pound steers. Most choice steers and yearlings went at \$22.50 to \$24.00.

A new high for this year's fed lamb crop was registered when a small lot sold at \$25.00. Prices were steady. Good and choice woolled lambs at \$22.50 to \$23.50. Salable receipts were estimated at 5,000 hogs; 3,000 cattle; 300 calves and 1,000 sheep.

CHICAGO (AP)—A new high since 1948 was set by soybeans on the board of trade again Thursday as prices whirled up after a little early hesitancy.

Old crop soybean futures were along in showing strength, although for modest gains most of the day. But the major grains all declined, wheat particularly being subjected to liquidation.

The new six-year peak on soybeans was set by the May contract at 3.59 1/4. Old crop soybeans closed 6-7 1/4 higher, March 3.58 1/4-3.59 1/4, while new crop months were lower to 1 cent higher.

**Hotel Union In Court Fight**  
EUGENE (AP)—An election by Eugene Hotel employees on whether they want the AFL Building Services Employees union to represent them was complicated Thursday by a court fight.

The hotel manager, Paul Lansdowne, filed a petition in Circuit Court asking a review of the issue which State Labor Examiner Fred Scherer had scheduled for Thursday afternoon voting.

Among other things, Lansdowne says Scherer should have included all hotel employees, not just those in the service departments such as maids and janitors. The dining room is not included in Scherer's order, which affects about 24 employees.

Scherer ordered the election after a hearing last month.

## Grain Storage Ships Docked

**TACOMA (AP)**—Preparations for the emergency storage of wheat aboard idle liberty ships began Wednesday afternoon when two of the liberties were towed to the Port of Tacoma from the Maritime Administration's Olympia reserve fleet.

Crews are expected to start cleaning out the ships before the weekend, with wheat tentatively scheduled to start piling into the vessels early next week.

Two Foss Launch and Tug Co. tugs towed the Clarence H. Matson from Olympia and two Puget Sound Tug and Barge Co. tugs brought the Hugh M. Smith to Tacoma. The tow took 5 1/2 hours.

Work to be accomplished before the wheat can be stored in the ships includes the laying of water power lines, general cleaning up and fumigation, according to W. E. Spofford, Olympia fleet superintendent.

Spofford said the Maritime Administration expects to take four ships a week from the fleet when the program gets under way. A total of 43 liberties, he reported, would be loaded with wheat and returned to Olympia.

Two other liberty ships, the George D. Prentice and the John H. Quick, were towed to Seattle by the same tug companies Wednesday.

## California FBI Captures Man

**OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)**—Basil Kingsley Beck—"a youthful and bad-tempered roamer" who made the FBI's "10 most wanted" list on his 21st birthday Monday—was picked up by stalking FBI agents Wednesday night in nearby San Pablo.

Beck, charged with murder and other crimes in three states, had been working in San Pablo at odd jobs under the name of Charles Wright. He offered no resistance when agents surrounded his car as he pulled to a stop. He was unarmed.

The capture resulted from an anonymous tip received by the FBI. Beck had lived in San Pablo briefly last June.

Beck was sought for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for burglary on Sept. 5, 1953. He and three other prisoners overpowered guards and escaped from a county jail at Oswego, Kan., where Beck was held on charges of burglary and larceny.

## Navy Announces Admiral Changes

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The Navy said Thursday that Rear Adm. Hugh H. Goodwin, presently commander of Carrier Division 2 in the Atlantic, has been assigned as commander of naval forces in the Philippine Islands.

He will succeed Rear Adm. Richard H. Cruzen, whose new assignment has not been announced.

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## Mother Cuts Small Girls

**TACOMA (AP)**—Two small girls are in a Tacoma hospital with their throats cut and their mother is being held under sheriff's orders in the same hospital with superficial cuts on her fingers after their horrified father and 10-year-old brother had summoned officers to their suburban home Thursday morning.

The girls, Nancy Iverson, 4, and Debra Iverson, 9 months, were taken to the hospital surgery rooms by Tacoma police officers and are reported to be in critical condition.

The father, Peter Iverson, truck driver, told County Detective Russ Wall that his oldest boy, Myron, got up about 6:30 a.m. and turned on a kitchen light. He was getting ready for school, he said.

The mother called to him to turn off the light, saying she wanted to get more sleep.

Iverson told Wall that shortly afterward his wife called to him saying "Come in and help me." When he entered the bedroom, he found her bent over the crib, cutting the baby's throat with a broken piece of mirror. Nancy's throat already had been cut, Wall said.

Iverson took the mirror away from his wife and had Myron telephone the police for assistance. Wall and Deputy Tom Durham went immediately to the Iverson residence. Wall said Mrs. Iverson was hysterical when taken to the hospital.

Iverson told wall his wife has been under a doctor's care for a nervous disorder in recent months. He and the boys have been sleeping in one bedroom and Mrs. Iverson and the girls have taken another.

## Suit Filed In Rail Fight

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Robert R. Young announced Thursday that he is filing suit against all 15 directors of the New York Central against their expenditure of "any monies of the New York Central Railroad Co. for the purpose of continuing themselves in office."

The suit is being brought in the New York State Supreme Court as a stockholder's action on behalf of Young, his associate Allan P. Kirby, and "all other stockholders of the New York Central Railroad Co. similarly situated."
