## Army Said Not Coddling Reds

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Wilson said Thursday "The idea that the Army is coddling Communists is just damn tommyrot."

Wilson made that comment at a news conference when questioned about the statement by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) that "Army brass" made a "sacred cow" of a "fifth amendment Communist."

Wilson was asked if he thought special legislation was necessary to rid the military establishment of Communists.

He replied he thought that might be "helpful, but I think I know how to get Communists out of the Army" with legislation, "just case by case."

He was asked whether he believed Secretary of the Army Stevens was responsible for tardiness in ousting Maj. Irving Peress.

"He's technically responsible because he is the boss," Wilson replied.

"Is Stevens going to resign because of this?"

"I wouldn't think so," Wilson answered.

Peress is the New York City dentist whose promotion and honorable discharge was investigated by McCarthy. Peress refused to answer questions from McCarthy as to whether he had had subversive affiliations.

**Leland Hayward Chosen To Produce Lindbergh Story**

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The story of Charles A. Lindbergh's flight from New York to Paris will finally reach the movie screens late this year.

Ever since his history-making journey, the Lone Eagle has resisted Hollywood offers to dramatize the story on film. When he published his own version of the flight last year, studios began bidding for rights to the book, "The Spirit of St. Louis." Lindbergh turned down their bids for one of a man who has never produced a movie before, Broadway showman Leland Hayward.

"When the book first came out I didn't even read it; I had always been so tied up with aviation myself," said Hayward, who is a pilot and founder of Southwest Airways.

"Then I got around to reading it. I was fascinated. When I came to the part where his wheels touched the ground at Le Bourget in Paris, the tears came to my eyes. I didn't think he could make it."

"It's a fabulous story. The Atlantic had been crossed before, but never from New York to Paris. It was a matter of the right man at the right time."

**Mickey Cohen Before Jury**

SEATTLE (AP) — A fifth amendment bill by Mickey Cohen before a federal grand jury, after he was brought from McNeil Island Federal Penitentiary, was reported here Thursday.

The Times said the notorious Los Angeles gambling figure, who has been the target of several assassination attempts, may be compelled to tell the grand jury here what he knows about the sources of a former California police officer's income or face a possible citation for contempt.

Cohen is serving a prison term for income tax evasion. He was taken before the grand jury Tuesday.

The Times said it learned he took refuge in the fifth amendment, contending that any testimony he gave might incriminate himself.

The U. S. District Court may be asked to rule on whether Cohen must testify or be held in contempt.

The Times said reliable sources have indicated that the Internal Revenue Service is seeking information about a former high ranking police officer of a small city near Los Angeles.

Cohen, 40, has served slightly more than two years under a five-year sentence. He is being guarded closely, while outside the prison, because of six previous attempts on his life.

**Funds Voted For Voice Of America**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Thursday voted to provide \$1,158,988.00 for the State, Justice and Commerce Departments and the "Voice of America" in the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

The action, however, is subject to a formal roll call vote Friday of the omnibus bill appropriating funds to operate those agencies. The tentatively approved total is \$144,532,960 less than President Eisenhower had proposed.

The bill provides these appropriations: State Department, \$108,410,000; Justice Department, \$178,542,000; Commerce Department \$808,222,000; U. S. Information Agency, which operates the "Voice," \$75,814,000.

Formerly local secretary of the AFL, Plumbers and Steamfitters Union, Nilsen was director of apprenticeship for five years in the State Labor Department.

He has been in private business here since 1922.

**Light Snow In Midwest**

A March snow storm that whipped Midwest and Northeastern states appeared diminishing Friday but cold weather spread across the Eastern half of the nation.

Only snow flurries were reported in the Midwest and Northeast early Friday as many areas dug out of heaviest snowfalls in several weeks. Flurries were reported in parts of Michigan, sections of the Lower Great Lakes region, extreme Northern New England and along the northwest slopes of the Central Appalachians, Northern Ohio and Western New York State were among hardest hit areas by the storms.

Light snow fell in the Texas-Oklahoma Panhandle but early the fall was not considered sufficient to affect the drought-stricken storm areas. There was sleet and light rain over the Southwestern Gulf region.

Skies were cloudy in coastal areas of California but mostly fair weather was reported in other parts of the country.

## American Guild of Organists Is Possibility for Klamath

Persons interested in the American Guild of Organists, a national, non-sectarian group, are invited to attend a meeting Monday evening, March 7, at 7:30 p.m. in the Immanuel Baptist Church, corner Eleventh and High. The meeting is planned, according to Ernest Armstrong, local organist, in the interests of organizing a chapter in Klamath Falls.

The purposes of the Guild with national headquarters in New York are: to advance the cause of worthy church music; to elevate the status of church musicians; to increase their appreciation of their responsibilities, duties and opportunities as conductors of worship; to raise the standard of efficiency of organists and choir directors by examinations in organ playing, in the theory of music, in general musical knowledge and in choir training; to grant certificates as Fellows, Associates or Choir Masters to members of the Guild who pass such examinations; to provide members with opportunities for meeting, for the discussion of professional topics.

The organization will be 57 years old this year. It has a national membership exceeding 12,000 and chapters of branches in every state over 200 in all.

Armstrong says it is the hope of interested persons locally that through the Guild, accomplished organists may be brought to the Klamath Basin for performances.

The Guild is chartered by the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York, which authorizes it to conduct examinations at such places or centers as will best accommodate candidates in all parts of the United States.
