 The movie was shown briefly at the Ritz Theater Dec. 30 and was halted by police. Members of the jury viewed the movie before reaching their decision.

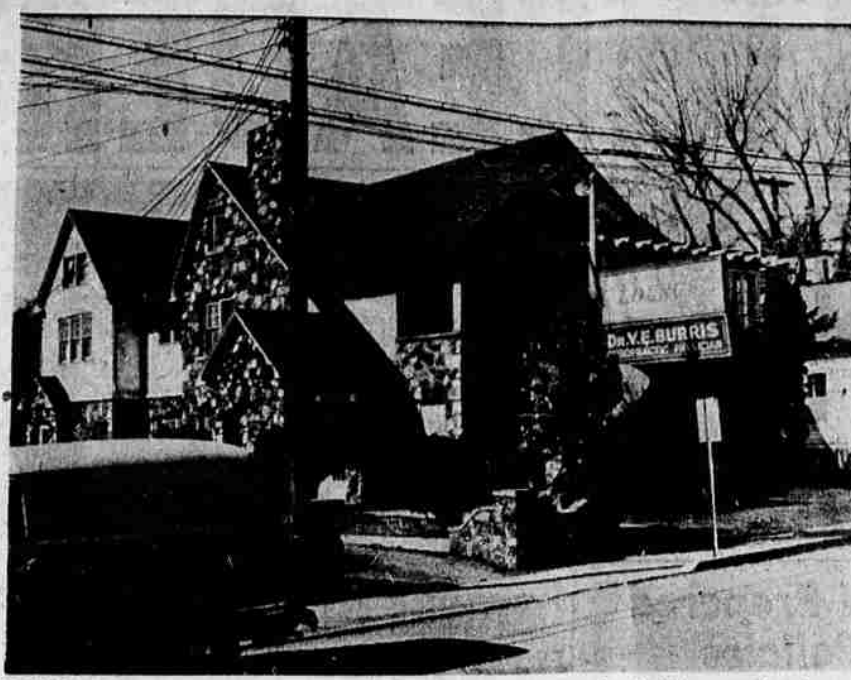
### Man Charged With Income Tax Evasion

## Aiken Urges Adoption Of Eisenhower Farm Program

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Chairman Aiken (R-Vt.) of the Senate Agriculture Committee, said today Congress will have to adopt the Eisenhower farm program as a whole or lose the value of it.  
 Aiken, a strong supporter of the program, hit out in an interview at any major modification of the program based on criticism of some features of it by individual members of Congress. According to Aiken, the program depends upon adopting all of it. Nearly everybody can find some parts or parts of it he likes. "For two days this week Aiken has been acting as sort of a referee for Agriculture Department officials and critical senators in a running dispute about new and old farm programs."  
 Main controversial center around proposals to shift government price supports to a flexible and lower level and to "set aside" 2 1/2 billion dollars worth of farm surpluses, or about half those now in government hands.  
 The set aside would be a guarantee by the government that the goods could never be moved in ordinary trade channels. Accordingly, they would not be counted as part of surpluses when the proposed new flexible supports, based on amount of various farm products available, were computed. This procedure presumably would make a transition to a flexible system less abrupt.  
 Late yesterday Aiken criticized people in government, including members of congress, "who believe in a permanent system of government controls."  
 President Eisenhower and Secretary of Agriculture Benson have said their new program would mean far less government control over what the farmer plants and markets.  
 "I am sorry to say it but I believe that those who favor controls are gaining," Aiken said. "They have almost gained control of one of our major political parties."  
 Department officials said the President would have authority to give all the set aside commodities away but Under Secretary of Agriculture True D. Morse later said such action was not contemplated.  
 He said recovery of some of the value of the produce was planned. Sen. Schoepel (R-Kan.) had said regular foreign purchasers of U.S. farm products might halt or delay sales if they had reason to hope for a free ride.  
 Other department spokesmen said they now are holding reserves for possible losses on more than 2 1/2 billion dollars of farm products held at the end of last year.  
 They said these reserves amounted to 636 million dollars or an average of 24 per cent with possible losses ranging from a low of 12 per cent on cotton up to 94 per cent on dried milk.  
 Public hearings will resume Tuesday.  
 Meanwhile a bill to provide 1 1/2 billion dollars more authority for farm price support loans guaranteed by the government to the President for expected signature.  
 The House yesterday finished action on the measure, which increases to a total of 8 1/2 billion dollars the authority of the Commodity Credit Corporation to guarantee farm price support loans during the rest of this year at the present mandatory levels.  
 The Department of Agriculture, looking ahead to the next grain harvest, said the summer would bring the most serious grain storage problems in history. It urged farmers to keep in farm storage about half a billion bushels of grain harvested in 1953, and offered them incentive storage payments. The department also called a national conference on the problem for Omaha, Neb., March 18.

## Malin Workmen Hurt In Fall

Two Malin workmen were brought to the Klamath Valley Hospital by Kaler's Ambulance suffering from injuries received when a scaffold on which they were working fell on them.  
 Lewis Bay, 71, and Emery Fleming, 45, employed by the Loveness Lumber Company, Malin, were working on a scaffold above a well about six miles southeast of Malin when in some manner the heavy plank scaffold collapsed.  
 Their injuries were being X-rayed this morning, but neither was considered to be seriously hurt.

## Big Dog Race Held In North

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — Charlie Titus, a 5-foot-5 Alaskan Indian from Minto Village drove his team of 10 malamutes at a 15 mile an hour pace over a snow-drifted 20-mile course Friday to win the opening heat of the North American Dog Mushing Championships.  
 Titus covered the extremely difficult course in 81 minutes 4 seconds but the important placement, in the eyes of the observers, was the second place taken by Dan Snyder, Kotzebue musher, with his "All Star" team of dogs from Eskimo villages north of the Arctic Circle.  
 Snyder's time was 82 minutes 50 seconds. This, the experts said, figured according to form. Titus won three out of the five first laps in the past championships here but never has won the title. He apparently was after his first lap victory and its \$400 prize money and put everything he had into the heat.  
 Snyder, playing his dogs smart, took it easy since he still has 50 miles of racing ahead in the next two days — and he is only a few minutes behind for time.  
 Saturday's heat will be over a 20-mile course, with 30 miles in Sunday's final lap.  
 Horace (Holy) Smoke, defending champion finished in a poor 14th position. Smoke was seeking his fourth consecutive championship here but he suffered a bad break when his skilled lead dog, Cation, had pups a few days ago. Cation couldn't lead his team so she has in the past three years.  
 A total of \$7,000 in prize money is posted for the winners of the derby. The grand champion takes approximately half and the remainder is divided between the heat winners.

DETROIT (AP) — Mrs. Lillian Squires said in a divorce petition today that when her husband, Wilson, goes fishing with his buddies, "nothing is too good for them."  
 She said, "when he takes me fishing, I have to sleep in the car."  
 The husband has not filed an answer to the suit which alleges cruelty.

## New Movie Star Keeps Own Name

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Jack Lemmon, the screen's brightest new leading man, will be allowed to keep his distinctive, slightly citrus name.  
 Lemmon is the Broadway and TV star who made a hit in his first picture, "It Should Happen to You," opposite Judy Holliday. Now he has the ideal assignment as co-star with Betty Grable in "Three for the Show." He may do the role of Enns Pulver in "Mister Roberts" on the screen.  
 Studio officials tried to get the young actor to change his name to Lennon.  
 "They argued that it would be dangerous with my own name," he told me. "They said that when I had my first bad picture, the critics would say, 'this movie is a lemon.'"  
 "But I wasn't going to give up a name I had spent years building up in New York. I stood my ground. And they finally gave in."  
 Another import from New York on "Three for the Show" is Myron McCormick, whose belly dance is as famous as any Egyptian's. He's the original and long-lasting Luth-RKO with SuperScope. The biggest laugh in the show came when he caused a ship taton on his stomach to undulate as if in high seas.
