

Roosevelt Picked As Candidate

LOS ANGELES (U) — James Roosevelt, accused by his estranged wife of being a philanderer, has won the endorsement of the Democratic party as its candidate for Congress in the 26th District.

Prior to the endorsement by the 26th District Democratic Council, made by acclamation on the second ballot, the 46-year-old insurance executive said in a speech that he decided to enter the race to "obliterate" charges against him and "clear against the ideals of my father."

The eldest son of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt made no specific reference to his wife's sensational separate maintenance suit, but he did say last night, "Personal questions are being used not only against me but against the Democratic party."

He added that the "questions" left him two choices, either to retire from public life, which he said would acknowledge "evidence of guilt and lack of courage," or:

"To come before the people and get elected to Congress and make a record which forever would be an answer to any sneers the opposition would make."

In her suit, Mrs. Romelle Roosevelt, 38, named three co-respondents and filed a letter signed by Roosevelt and admitting infidelities with nine other women. He has denied all the charges, saying he was forced to sign the letter in 1945 to prevent his wife from divorcing him and thus adding to the burdens of his father as president.

TAIPEH, Formosa (U) — The minority Democratic Socialist party is planning token opposition to the almost-certain re-election of Chiang Kai-shek as Nationalist China's president.

The party decided yesterday to run its acting chairman, Hsu Fu-lin, for the presidency.

Chiang, whose Kuomintang (Nationalist party) controls 80 per cent of the Assembly seats, is considered a shoo-in.

A president will be elected later this month by the Assembly.

New Avalanches In Austria

INNSBRUCK, Austria (U) — Austria's toll of avalanche deaths over the past weekend climbed to 12 today as rescue workers uncovered the bodies of three more skiers buried under a 30-foot-deep snow slide.

It took rescue workers 12 hours to find the three Austrians.

The deaths brought to 153 the number killed by snow slides in Austria this year.

Forest Chief Gives Bug Fight Plans

WASHINGTON (U) — Except for a \$44,000 program in the LaGrande unit of Eastern Oregon, the Forest Service plans temporarily to call off its fight against the ravages of the spruce budworm.

But Edward P. Cliff, assistant forest chief, made clear in outlining agency plans to a House Appropriations subcommittee recently, that the battle is not being abandoned.

"There is not enough money in the budget to undertake spraying of these budworm projects and at the same time handle the other epidemics which are faster moving and actually or potentially more destructive," he said.

In testimony made public Monday, Cliff said the agency has decided "because of the more urgent need to use the money available on the bark beetle control programs, on the pine butterfly program and for continuing work on the most important smaller projects scattered throughout the country to effect control while they are still small."

The Forest Service's proposed budget for the year beginning July 1 contains \$2,555,000 for forest pest control work.

First in the agency's thoughts this year, Cliff said, are the spruce bark beetles in North Idaho and Western Montana which already have killed 1 1/2 billion board feet of timber.

He said the epidemic, resulting from heavy winds in 1949 and 1950, is located in an area "where six billion board feet of the highest quality spruce timber we had in this country is immediately threatened. It is expected that about 880 million board feet will be infested when the fight takes place next June or July."

The agency proposed to spend \$880,000 on control in this area as compared with \$720,000 in the present fiscal year.

No control program, other than quick detection and salvage logging, is contemplated, he said, although additional surveys and research are planned.

WASHINGTON (U) — House members Monday were able to poke some fun at themselves a week after they were targets of a wild fusillade from the pistols of four Puerto Rican fanatics.

Congressional jokesters made no attempt to play down their basic view of the shooting as a tragic affair. But humor is a favorite means of lightening the legislative grind, and with all five recovering, House humor began to reassert itself.

Some gags revolved around the plentiful news accounts of members standing near or giving aid to one or another of the wounded. Said one: "With that mob around them, how did a bullet ever get through?"

Other jests stemmed from the many reports of people who shared in capturing the attackers. Reps. Wolcott (R-Mich) and Clarence J. Brown (R-Ohio) offered a make-believe award to any member who could prove he did not take part in the capture.

Rep. Vinson of Georgia, senior Democrat on the Armed Services Committee, wasn't at the scene himself. But he suggested legislation to set up three types of pay for those who were under fire:

1. Combat pay—For those who stood up under fire.
2. Flight pay—For those who fled the chamber.
3. Submarine pay—For those who dived under their seats.

Gen. China, captured Jan. 15, dispatched messages to Mau Mau jungle hideouts last week telling other leaders to lay down their arms.

DACCA, Pakistan (U) — The voters of Pakistan's jute-producing eastern portion trooped to the polls Monday to elect a 306-member East Pakistan Assembly. The main issue was whether the area should loosen its political ties with the central Karachi government, separated from it by more than 1,000 miles of India.

Long Flight Made By Jets

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (U) — Twelve big stratojet bombers completed an exercise in "global mobility" Friday when they arrived at March Air Force Base after a non-stop flight from England.

The first bomber to land made the 5,860-mile trip over land and sea in 12 hours and 21 minutes. All of the bombers were refueled twice while in flight.

The pilot of the lead plane was Col. John B. Henry Jr., commander of the 22nd Bomb Wing. He said the crossing was uneventful except for heavy head winds along portions of the course. Colonel Henry said his six-jet bomber was refueled by an aerial tanker, once over the Atlantic and again over the United States.

The dozen arrivals here Friday were the first batch of 5 stratojet bombers returning from Upper Heyford in England. Others are expected to arrive Saturday and Sunday.
