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Police Check Missing Case

The possibility of foul play or amnesia is feared by the family of Thomas Mansfield, 51 year old Klamath man, missing since Friday evening.

Mansfield, head custodian at the Roosevelt school, left his home at 5575 Shasta Way about 7:30 p.m. Friday to drive down town to purchase magazines.

His car, a black 1950 Hudson convertible, was found Saturday morning near the Klamath Memorial Cemetery, keys to the car and to the Roosevelt School building were found on the floor. Several small coins were also found on the floor of the car.

Mansfield was apparently feeling fine at the time he left home, according to his wife, he informed her he would be gone only a few minutes. The family had formerly lived at 4803 Balsam Drive but several months ago moved to Shasta Way.

A better description of the missing man and his clothing was given by Mrs. Mansfield, who stated he is 51 years of age, 5 feet 9 inches tall and weighs about 165 pounds. The head of a woman is tattooed on his right forearm.

At the time of his leaving home he was wearing a blue sport shirt, black Frisco jeans and a grey sauteen coat with fur collar.

The missing man had cashed a pay check for about \$300 Friday and he is believed to have had this money on his person when he disappeared.

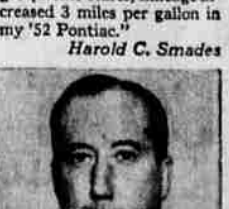
