Moore 'Brutal' At 190 1/2

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore said Wednesday he "felt wonderful" as he carried 190 1/2 pounds — the greatest fighting weight of his career — to a slashing non-title victory Tuesday night over Bob Baker.

Referee Pete Sarro stopped the Miami Beach Auditorium battle at 2:08 of the ninth round with Baker reeling under a savage attack by Moore and bleeding from the mouth, nose and cuts over both eyes.

DREAMING
Still dreaming of a crack at Rocky Marciano's heavyweight crown, Moore declared he "felt fine" at 194 pounds over the limit for the class he has ruled.

Moore's weight, which he carried beautifully, left ringside experts doubtful that he would again be able to make the 175-pound light heavyweight limit without weakening himself badly.

The champion's manager, Charley Johnson, insisted that Moore could get down to the light heavyweight limit, but said his man wanted to stay in the heavyweight ranks and campaign for Marciano.

LIGHTLY
Joe Schaefer, Miami promoter, said after Tuesday night's fight that he would guarantee Marciano \$20,000 if he would fight Moore here, but the offer was taken lightly in fight circles. Manager Al Wall's future plans for Rocky are reported to include no part of the ancient but powerful Moore.

A crowd of 2,784 paid a gross gate of \$10,080 to see Archie give Baker, the 209-pound Pittsburgh heavyweight, a savage beating in a scheduled 10-rounder.

Doctor Says Ted 'Fine'

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—"Remarkably fine" was the doctor's report Wednesday on Boston Red Sox star Ted Williams—who underwent an 80-minute operation Tuesday on his broken left collarbone.

Dr. Russell F. Sullivan, who wired the \$100,000-a-year slugger's collarbone in Santa Maria Hospital, said Williams would be released from the hospital late this week or early next week.

Williams suffered the injury in a fall while chasing a line drive only 10 minutes after starting his first workout of the season March 1 at the team's Sarasota, Fla., training camp.

Dr. Sullivan said Williams should be able to play baseball in eight weeks.

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Missouri Quint Stuns Kansas; Kentucky Out

NEW YORK (AP)—Only one spot remained to be filled in the round of 16 in the NCAA basketball tourneys today—and that vacancy is the result of one of the most stunning upsets in Big Seven history.

Missouri, with a mediocre 5-6 record in conference play, surged from behind in the third quarter to defeat Dr. Phog Allen's Kansas Jayhawks 76-87 last night and send the hoop into a deadlock for first place.

Now both Kansas and Colorado boast 10-2 records and the NCAA representative will be decided by a draw from a hat late today in the Kansas City office of Reeves Peters, executive secretary of the Big Seven.

A question that had been puzzling the experts for the past two weeks also was answered when Kentucky, winner of the Southeastern Conference, withdrew from the NCAA Tournament because its three big stars were ineligible. Without Cliff Hagan, Frank Ramsey and Lou Tsiropoulos, who are not permitted to perform in NCAA postseason competition because they are graduate students, the Wildcats couldn't hope to win the tournament.

LEAGUE TITLE
They captured the league crown last night in a playoff with Louisiana State 53-56 and immediately announced they would bypass the NCAA Louisiana State, which finished the loop season with a 14-0 slate, the same as Kentucky, was given the berth.

Kentucky, No. 1 team in the country, went unbeaten in 25 games, a record achieved by few schools over the years.

One other conference champion was decided when Cornell whipped Princeton 46-44 in a playoff for the Ivy League title. Santa Clara, Penn State, Notre Dame, Bradley and Idaho State gained their round of 16 berths in the tournament.

WINNING GOAL
Cornell had not won an Ivy League championship since 1924. Henry Buncom, a substitute, made just one field goal and that was the winning one, with exactly one second to go.

Santa Clara won a 73-64 victory over Texas Tech, and Idaho State scored a 77-75 triumph over Seattle at Corvallis, Ore. in overtime. This was another major reversal in view of the fact that Seattle had run up a 28-game winning streak since losing its opener.

At Port Wayne, Ind., Penn State turned back Toledo 62-50 with a late scoring burst and Notre Dame whipped Loyola of the South 80-70 for its 17th straight. In the single game at Peoria, Ill.

MITCHELL IS SECOND
CLEVELAND (AP)—Dale Mitchell, hard-hitting outfielder for the Indians, holds the second best lifetime batting average in the American League. Dale owns a .315 mark for 856 games. The 32-year-old left-handed swinger has been with the Indians since 1948.

The top lifetime mark in the league, of course, belongs to Ted Williams of the Red Sox. His average is .348 in 1,464 games.

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Chieftains Upset

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Santa Clara and a crew of deadly push shot experts from Idaho State will move into the Far Western regional NCAA basketball playoffs here Friday and Saturday.

Navy vs. Cornell and North Carolina State vs. La Salle at Philadelphia.

Penn State vs. LSU and Notre Dame vs. Indiana at Iowa City. Bradley vs. Kansas or Colorado and Rice vs. Oklahoma A&M at Stillwater, Okla.

Santa Clara vs. Colorado A&M and Idaho State vs. Southern California at Corvallis, Ore.

The National Invitation Tournament in Madison Square Garden went according to form last night as top-seeded Duquesne and Holy Cross gained the semifinal round. The Dukes won a struggle from St. Francis of Loretto, Pa., 69-63, while Holy Cross crushed St. Francis of Brooklyn 93-69.

Eight schools moved along in the NIAA (small college) Tournament at Kansas City. Last night's results included Geneva (Pa.) 88, Indiana State 82; Lawrence Tech (Mich.) 75, Carroll (Wis.) 70; Southeastern Oklahoma 68, Montana 62; Pasadena (Calif.) 79, Bridgeport (Conn.) 60; Southeast Louisiana 77, Georgetown (Ky.) 76; St. Benedict's (Kan.) 68; East Carolina 61; Gustavus Adolphus 104, Mississippi Southern 64; St. Ambrose (Iowa) 77, North Dakota 70.

Idaho State upset Seattle, ranked 11th nationally in The Associated Press poll, in an overtime thriller, 77-75, and Santa Clara ousted Texas Tech 73-64 in an elimination doubleheader here Tuesday night to qualify for the regionals.

Idaho State will meet Southern California and Santa Clara will play Colorado A&M in the playoffs Friday.

SPECTACULAR
Idaho State caught the fancy of a crowd of 5,045 in Tuesday night's doubleheader by overcoming Seattle's superior height with a display of spectacular long-range shooting in the last half.

The Idahoans, champions of the Rocky Mountain Conference, sank nine in a row in a rally that started in the middle of the third period, after Seattle had built up an 11-point lead.

Just before the third period ended Idaho State overtook Seattle 53-52 and then fought evenly with Seattle through a scrambling fourth period which ended 68-66.

TWO GOALS
In the overtime Idaho State managed to get just two field goals, while Seattle was getting three, but the victors made six free throws without a miss for the win. The decisive points were two free throws by 6-7 center Rick Bauer with four seconds remaining.

Bauer was the only really big man the victors had. But Sam Beckham, a 6-2 forward, took rebounds as if he were six inches taller, and contributed 20 points. The other forward, Les Rob, 6 feet, also scored 20. Idaho State wound up making 42 per cent of its shots. Seattle made 34 per cent.

22 POINTS
Joe Pehanick, 6-9 center for Seattle, also had 20, but a 5-9 Seattle guard, Cal Bauer, outscored them all by driving in for 22 points.

Santa Clara, a veteran team that has height and poise, had its hands full with scrappy Texas Tech in the first half, but then Santa Clara's experience began to tell.

The Californians took over at both backboards and gradually pulled away. At one point in the fourth quarter, the Californians had a 17-point margin. They coasted in from there.

Ken Sears, 6-9 Santa Clara forward, also had 20, but a 5-9 Seattle guard, Cal Bauer, outscored them all by driving in for 22 points.

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
