Symington, McCarthy Have Tiff

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sens. McCarthy (R-Wis.) and Symington (D-Mo) clashed angrily at a public hearing Wednesday when McCarthy accused a fellow senator of misrepresenting facts on a television program. He did not name the senator.

Symington said he assumed McCarthy's remarks were aimed at Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.), who was absent from the hearing, and added:

"I suggest you wait until the senator is present to defend himself."

McCarthy, presiding at a session of his investigations subcommittee, beat a glass ash tray on the table in an effort to silence Symington.

The exchange came during the appearance of a Clifton, N. J., draftsman who refused to say whether he has ever been a Communist.

The witness, Leo Kantowitz, 38, testified he had been given security clearance to work on classified electronics projects for the government, but said he didn't recall that any of his bosses ever asked whether he was a Communist.

McCarthy asked Kantowitz "would you consider yourself a current Communist" or "as one of the senators has suggested, an old warner over biscuit." McCarthy said the senator had used the "warmed over" term in a television program, but never did specifically name the senator.

McCarthy and Symington, each glib with a good, loud speaking voice, talked simultaneously some of the time, with the rapping of the ash tray adding to the clamor.

McCarthy insisted that "day after day" the subcommittee has been uncovering new cases. He said he objects to "irresponsible and false statements" about the subcommittee, but did not relate that protest to any particular individual.

Symington made himself heard with an observation that "I'm sure Sen. Jackson would defend himself" if he were in the room.

"I cannot force any senator to attend," McCarthy retorted.

He said all members of the subcommittee had received advance notice of the meeting, and that he was "getting rather sick" of charges that he runs a "one-man committee."

Members of Jackson's staff told reporters that the senator was working on a speech at the time of the McCarthy-Symington exchange, and had left orders not to be disturbed.

Peter A. Gragis of Levittown, N. Y., testified briefly Wednesday, naming Kantowitz among persons he said he had known as fellow Communists while working on classified electronics projects for the government.

Gragis testified last Friday he was a member of a Communist cell at the federal telecommunications laboratory at Nutley, N. J. in the 1940s. He also said he had no knowledge of any espionage there; he said he broke with communism in 1950.

US Defense Leaders Tell Policies

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's top defense officials, uniformed and civilian, say the administration's new military policy is a complex thing which does not rely solely on atomic power or any other single factor.

"It is not correct to say that we are relying exclusively on one weapon, or one service, or that we are anticipating one kind of war," Adm. Arthur Radford said in a New York speech Tuesday night.

"I believe that this nation would be a prisoner of its own military posture if it had no capability, other than to deliver a massive atomic attack."

Radford told the Economic Club of New York that the joint chiefs of staff, which he chairs, do not "subscribe to the thinking that the ability to deliver massive atomic retaliation is, by itself, adequate to meet all our security needs."

Secretary of State Dulles has said the nation will rely primarily on "massive retaliation"—presumably with atomic weapons—in the event of new Communist aggression.

Secretary of Defense Wilson was asked at a news conference late Tuesday to comment on criticism of that policy voiced Saturday night by Adlai E. Stevenson, Democratic presidential nominee in 1952. Stevenson had questioned whether the nation was left with "the grim choice of inaction or a thermonuclear holocaust."

Wilson's only comment: "Do you think he's an expert on the matter?"

He went on to say he doubts there is any simple answer for explaining the "new look" military program. He said that "from the military point of view we are not relying on any one thing" for a broad defense.
