**Chains Needed On Most Roads**

SALEM (#) — Chains should be carried on most mountain summits, the Oregon Highway Commission warned Wednesday as the mountains got their first heavy snowfall in several weeks.

The commission said chains should be carried at these points: Government Camp, which has 3 inches of new snow; Timberline, 4 inches; Sunset Summit, 4 inches; Siskiyou Summit, 4 inches; Santiam Summit, 8 inches; Williamson Pass, 6 inches; Meacham, 4 inches; and Austin, 2 inches.

The commission also said chains are required on Highway 199 in Northern California.

All other points reported bare pavement.
