Excise Tax Cut Bill Passes House; Senate Nod Likely

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill to slash about 25 federal excise taxes by 312 million dollars has won overwhelming House passage and today appeared likely to get swift Senate approval too.

The House speeded the measure to the Senate yesterday by a 11-3 vote despite opposition from the Eisenhower administration.

The cuts, representing the first major downward revision of the excises or sales taxes in 20 years, would add almost a billion dollars to a deficit already forecast by the President at \$2,900,000,000 for the year starting July 1.

The bill also includes something the administration wants and had figured into its budget for fiscal 1955—extensions of some steeper excises voted after the Korean War began. The Treasury would lose another \$1,070,000,000 in revenue if these were to expire April 1 as scheduled.

You'll remember that Miss Loy, who was named four times in private life, was named the perfect mate after she starred in "The Thin Man" with William Powell. Now it's Miss Allyson. She appears to have two husbands—her real mate, a former crooner named Dick Powell, and her screen hubby, James Stewart. She admits that she often sees more of Stewart than of Powell.

Legion Plans Annual Contest

The "Why I Teach" contest for school teachers in America is being sponsored again this year for the second time by the American Legion Auxiliary.

Purpose of the contest is to interest more young people of high type in entering the teaching profession by having experienced teachers tell about the rewards of teaching.

The American Legion Auxiliary recognizes that the future of this country depends to a large degree upon the kind of teachers and the kind of teaching in the nation's schools.

Through this realization came the plan for sponsoring the contest that takes the form of an open letter to a young person about to be graduated from high school, setting forth the purposes and goals of a teacher in free America.

Rules for the 1954 contest follow: An aspirant in competition for prizes must be a teacher in any accredited grade or high school; must be a fully certified teacher and must have completed five full years of teaching at the end of this school term; the entrant shall submit a statement, an open letter to a high school graduate on the subject, "Why I Teach." The statement must not exceed 300 words or be less than 100. A release must be signed giving the American Legion Auxiliary permission to use the statement of the contestant for promoting interest in the teaching profession.

Entries must be submitted together with the release not later than May 1, 1954 to Mrs. Carl W. Zeller, National Security Chairman, National Headquarters, American Legion Auxiliary, 777 N. Meridian Street, Indianapolis 7, Indiana.

Local units of the American Legion Auxiliary are at Klamath and Tulelake.

Florence Ogle of Klamath unit, No. 8, has contacted both city and county school officials with the suggestion that qualified teachers consider entering this contest during Spring vacation.

Amount of prizes will be announced later.

Opponent Picked For Roosevelt

CULVER CITY, Calif. (AP)—The 26th Congressional District Republican organization last night endorsed Theodore R. Owings as its candidate for the House seat that Democrat James Roosevelt is seeking.

Owings, Culver City clerk, told a cheering throng that "I want this to be a nice family contest between myself and Mr. Roosevelt."

Last Sunday Roosevelt received the 26th District Democratic Council endorsement. Another Democrat, Ned Redding, community newspaper publisher, already has filed his nomination papers to oppose Roosevelt in the primary election June 8.

Europe Gets Good Spring Weather

LONDON (AP)—Spring broke through early in much of Western Europe today, drawing crowds to the Continent's sidewalk cafes and melting memories of the worst winter freeze-up in years.

NICE, France (AP)—Danger of new avalanches has suspended attempts to recover the bodies of eight Americans still missing from the wreckage of a U.S. Air Force C47 transport.

Ship Storage Of Grain Started

SEATTLE (AP)—The first grain in the Pacific Northwest marine storage program was placed aboard the Liberty ship George B. Prentice here Wednesday.

The grain—6,000 tons of eastern white wheat from the Inland Empire—was the first of 800,000 tons the Agriculture Department plans to store on ships of the Marine Administration's reserve fleet at Olympia and Astoria.

Six other reserve fleet ships are in the harbor here and at Tacoma awaiting their turn at the loading spouts.

The department said 46 vessels will be used in the storage program before June.

Love For Queen Shown By Girl

BRISBANE, Australia (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II has shared the platform with a raft of kiddies in her world travels, but 4-year-old Narelle Dick is way ahead of the rest.

And Narelle's co-starring was strictly unscheduled.

During the Queen's visit to the Brisbane exhibition ground yesterday, the little girl left her mother in the grandstand sidled slowly down to the date where the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh sat.

Smiling serenely and ignoring of officials' clutching hands, she crossed the red carpet, climbed into Elizabeth's lap, threw her arms around the royal neck and tried to kiss her.

The startled monarch held the tot for an instant, then gently pushed her away and kept smiling as the crowd of thousands gasped.

Narelle struggled and kicked as Police Inspector T. J. Clark carried her back to her mother.

Canadian Whale Hunt Begins

COAL HARBOR, B. C. (AP)—The 20th-century version of "The Whale" sounded across the Pacific Ocean's stormy waters today as six sturdy boats started a hunt for 600 whales.

The ships left here yesterday and will range from 100 to 200 miles out of this shore station deep in Quatsino Sound on the northwest coast of Vancouver Island.

They seek humpback, finback, sei, blue and sperm whales in the only whaling expedition known to operate this far north in the Pacific.

They will conclude their search six months from now. It is hoped the catch will be big enough and expenses small enough to show a profit—a result obtained only once before in the six years of operation by the B. C. Packers, Ltd.

Five vessels, with 25-man crews, harpooned 530 whales last year in a season cut short two weeks by a Pacific storm.

Farm Production Said To Be Good

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department said Thursday a mild winter and prospects for an early spring are providing farmers with advantages that tend to offset producer concern over widespread shortages of soil moisture.

The department said farmers had been able to make good progress on spring farm work. In addition, the weather has been favorable for the survival—except in some extreme drought areas—of wheat and other grain crops sown last fall for harvest next summer.

Furthermore, the mild weather has permitted grazing of live stock in open fields and otherwise helped conserve feed supplies.

Seeding of spring grains was said to be proceeding rapidly as far north as Kansas. Planting of cotton, corn and sorghums was said to be under way in the South.
