Final Services Held For Woman

CHILOQUIN — Funeral services for Mrs. Leonard Swanson were held at the Chiloquin Methodist Church Friday morning, March 5, and concluding services at the Donelson-Sewell Mortuary at Hillsboro on Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. Swanson, born Mary Luella Harrow in Portland, April 19, 1903, died Tuesday, March 2, in Klamath Falls after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage a few hours previously.

The Rev. Edmund Stanton conducted both services. In Chiloquin Elida DeBortoli sang "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" and "Higher Ground." Pallbearers were Joe Adamo, John Mannerling, Lester and Layton Hoback, Glen Kircher and Earl Hall. Honorary pallbearer was Charles Hale.

The Swansons moved to Collier Park, where he was superintendent, in 1950. They made themselves part of the community, helping on numerous public picnics, with Camp Fire Girls and activities of the Methodist Church. Swanson was also active with the Moose Lodge in Klamath Falls. Just a year ago Swanson had to undergo an operation which left him partially paralyzed and he had to give up his job.

During the past year the Swansons have lived in Chiloquin where she worked at Gieners Dry Goods. Her sudden death last week left her husband, who is still unable to walk, and three children, George 13, Sally, 12, and Billy 8.

Although there were beautiful floral arrangements at Mrs. Swanson's service, local friends donated chiefly to a memorial fund for the family. When the money, over \$600, was given to the family they expressed their heartfelt gratitude to the hundreds of people who had helped.

The RCAF said the two-engine plane from the United States left Port Hardy on Vancouver Island at 1:10 p.m. Wednesday and was due at Annette at 4:20 p.m. The search was ordered when it failed to arrive on schedule.
