Girl Scout Leader Named

The announcement of the appointment of Mrs. Keith Cobo, Klamath Falls, to serve as Girl Scout executive, was made this week, to coincide with the annual celebration of the birthday anniversary of Girl Scouting.

Mrs. Cobo's official title is Council Assistant, pending confirmation by the national office of her status as executive director.

She will succeed Shirley Matzoll, who has held the position since September 1953. Miss Matzoll, who will return to her home state, Minnesota, to continue in professional scout work, will remain in Klamath Falls until the end of May to assure the best possible continuity of service to local troops.

Lent, beginning with Ash Wednesday, is the period of 40 weekdays preceding Easter Eve, devoted to fasting and penitence in commemoration of Christ in the wilderness. It is a time of contemplation, prayer and expressions of gratitude for the magnificent gesture of Almighty God, who so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son. It is a period of longing and yearning for the reliving of the triumphant resurrection on Easter Sunday.

Lenten observances vary, of course, depending upon personalities and religious affiliations, but general Christian practice includes, to some degree, voluntary subjection of appetites and passions by self-denial or discipline. In itself, this mortification is not an end, but an means by which we may hasten the certainty of our experiencing the Beatific Vision.

By His suffering, death and resurrection, Christ does not guarantee salvation to everybody, but, rather, assures the attainability of salvation to anybody! It would be

As the inimitable G. K. Chesterton acutely observed "Christianity has not failed... it has never been tried!" The increasing popularity of the philosophy, "non impetere," or toleration in regard to moral transgression, is theologically not plausible. Christian obligation hardly ends with endeavors for self-perfection, but it is through these efforts that we increase our capacity for efficacious dissemination of the World of God. As lay apostles of Jesus Christ, we must exert an unremitting effort to abide by the laws of God as concerns our immortal personal souls and extend those efforts to the spiritual benefaction of mankind.

During Lent, through mortification, prayer and contemplation, we may revive, at the side of Christ, His passion, death and resurrection, preparing for the ineffable challenge of salvation for all. That is what lent means to me
