



LEAVE IT TO THE LADIES! They're not always found sitting on a fine cushion and sewing fine seams . . . sometimes they step into rubber boots and keep a watchful eye on the meat that is headed for Klamath Falls tables.

Irene Potest is one of three city-employed women meat inspectors, working under Dr. J. C. Hunt, city sanitary inspector.

Her day starts by 7 a.m. when she gets for hours of work at Bratton's on the Keno Highway. She is ready for battle when the first animal goes into the killing room, waiting to delve into the inner mysteries of cattle, hogs and sheep to guard against any possibility of tainted meat reaching the consumer.

Her ante-mortem (before killing) inspection is to keep watch for disease, principally eye cancer and tuberculosis that will send the victim to the tallow plant instead of the skillet or roasting pan. Her post-mortem, may catch measles, a disease common in cattle, or liver fluke, which attacks the liver of animals. This is no cursory examination. Irene Potest watches with eagle eye for the faintest trace of any indication that the carcass is not up to the standard set by state and federal inspection laws. No stamp of approval is ever put on a dressed animal unless it meets those standards.

Here is no job for a "squeamish gal." One who swoons at a nicked finger had better stay "long gone" from a killing plant, yet Irene Potest manages to look groomed and serene in surroundings that would test the mettle of many a man. She looks at a swinging beef with as much interest as though she were sizing up a Dior satin windbreaker or a Lanvin-Castillo favorite in white organdy.

She comes from a family of butchers and that no-doubt accounts for her poise in a forest of cooling halves of beef. Her grandfather, in business in the mid-west, was followed in the trade by her father, now retired. Her brother Bob Potest operates a shop in Jurgenson's on Oregon Avenue and Irene Potest studied animal husbandry and agriculture in Miami Junior College at Tahlequah, Oklahoma.

She taught a primary grade for three years, then learned the fur finishing business, working in that field for seven years, managing a store during part of that time. From California she came to Klamath Falls. She belongs to the Disabled Veteran's auxiliary, teaches English to aspirants to U.S. citizenship . . . is a member of the Christian Church and skims around a dance floor for recreation.

A brother "Peanuts" Potest is employed in the Klamath County assessor's office. The two other women meat inspectors are Ruth Breazeale at the Klamath Pack and Ethel Stall at T & P.

Until she came to our town, Irene Potest "never dreamed" of entering the field she now serves in. "They needed someone, and well, here I am," said this attractive woman with the flashing smile.
