### Oregonians Honored

Seven Oregonians are among west coast employees of Pacific Telephone named to receive recognition for "noteworthy public service" under a memorial created in 1920 for Theodore N. Vail, pioneer president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Top award, a bronze Vail Medal, goes to Richard B. Bates of Medford, for "initiative and prompt action" at the scene of an automobile accident near Siskiyou Summit last April. First aid and other assistance given by Bates are credited with saving the life of a woman critically injured, when a car in which she was riding with three other persons plunged over a 250 foot embankment. Two of the occupants were killed outright, and a third died later of internal injuries.

Bates, a maintenance cable splicer, is one of five Pacific Telephone employees on the coast named to receive the bronze Vail medal this year. Others so honored are Mrs. Nettie Leer, Seattle, and Edward Johnson, Michael O'Mullen and Albert Hart, all of Los Angeles.

Six of the fourteen certificates of honorable mention awarded in the five-state area served by Pacific Telephone go to Oregon employees.

Credited with saving the lives of persons involved in automobile accidents, through the prompt and effective use of first aid training and equipment were: Wesley Schulz and Daniel Miller, linemen, James Wells, toll repairman, and Larry Graham, tractor operator, all of Portland, and James Bottger, lineman, Baker, Mrs. Joyce Wheeler, Cottage Grove operator, received her citation for quick thinking and initiative at the switchboard in summoning police and firemen to the home of an invalid endangered by fire.

Schulz received a silver Vail medal and \$500 in cash in 1949 for his heroism in rescuing a man buried by a cave in. He was presented with the earlier awards by then Governor Douglas McKay. Pacific Telephone Manager S. C. Bowie, who made the announcement of the year's awards, said they were based on recommendations of a coast-wide committee of employees and management personnel.
