Change Seen For Wool Price Props

Wool prices, for both shorn and pulled wools, will be supported through loans this year unless there is a change in price-support legislation, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced. Only shorn wools were supported by loans in 1953. Pulled wool was supported by direct purchases.

The loans will be of two kinds, non-recourse and advance loans. Both will be available from May 1, 1954, through March 31, 1955. The non-recourse loans will be at 90 per cent of parity on March 15, 1954, but will be not less than the minimum national average of 52.1 cents per pound on a grease basis and will mature April 30, 1955. Advance loans will be made at 70 per cent of the estimated value of the wool. They mature in six months or March 31, 1955, whichever is earlier. They may be converted into nonrecourse loans.

The program will operate through wool handlers who have been approved to act for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. To be eligible for a loan under the 1954 program, wool must be in merchantable condition and stored in an approved warehouse prior to February 28, 1955. The appraisal request, which is a part of the process of getting a loan, must be made by February 28.

Wool shorn or pulled after January 1, 1954, which is not eligible under the 1953 price-support program, will be eligible under the 1954 program. Prior to May 1, handlers and wool growers can complete the required preparations for a loan, such as grading, putting the wool in merchantable condition, storing and making appraisal requests.

If proposed new legislation is enacted for wool price support the new method may be made available to producers before the end of the marketing year, even though the 1954 program is already in operation. In this event, loans would no longer be available, but wool would be eligible for support under the new program. The USDA contemplates that wool placed under the 1954 loan program will be eligible under the new support method, provided the loans are redeemed by producers.
