CHICAGO LIVESTOCK
CHICAGO (U) - Hogs sold strong to 25 cents higher in fairly active dealings Wednesday.
Buyers paid \$25.50 to \$26.10 for most choice 180 to 280 pound butchers and bought one load at \$26.46, the top. Offerings weighing 290 to 330 pounds showed the full 25 cent advance, selling for \$23.00 to \$23.50.
Steers generally sold steady to 25 cents lower but a new high for the year was uncovered when a load of high prime steers, weighing around 1,175 pounds, sold for \$32.25.

Shakeup Seen In Pakistan

DACCA, East Pakistan (U) - Early results in the election for East Pakistan's Assembly today indicated a landslide victory for the opposition bloc which wants to slip loose the ties with the central government more than a thousand miles across India from here.
The five-party opposition front scored a major upset by defeating Chief Minister Nazimuddin, a leader of the ruling Muslim League party of which Pakistan's Prime Minister Mohammed Ali is top man. He was beaten by 6,607 votes by a young college student, Khalid Nawaz Khan. A minister in Amin's Cabinet, Abdul Hamid, also was defeated.
The incomplete results gave the opposition 51 and the Muslim League party only 2 of the seats in the 308-member Assembly. Final results are not expected before March 25.
Leaders of the Muslim League anticipated that the voting trend in favor of the opposition group would continue as the counting progressed.
The setback to the league appeared to pose a serious threat to the national government, not only in East Pakistan but also in its control of the Pakistan National Assembly and perhaps even in the national government itself. Predictions were current that Prime Minister Ali would have to shake up his Cabinet.
The opposition demands that the government in Karachi control only East Pakistan's defense, foreign affairs and communications. The leaders charge the central government with treating this area, comprising 44 of Pakistan's 78 million people and producing the jute which provides the country with 70 per cent of its foreign exchange, "like some kind of colony."
Muslim League leaders have contended the opposition leaders really want East Pakistan to secede from Karachi completely and join up with India.

Human Rights Discussed

CARACAS, Venezuela (U) - The 10th Inter-American Conference today took up a proposal asking the American nations to adjust their domestic legislation in accordance with declarations on human rights.
The resolution was presented to the Committee on Social Matters yesterday by El Salvador, backed by Argentina, the Dominican Republic and Honduras. It came to study the Seven-point proposal before opening debate.
The resolution would "recommend to the American states that they adopt progressive measures to adjust their domestic legislation in accordance with the American Declaration on Human Rights and Duties of Man (adopted at the Bogota conference in 1948) and the Universal Declaration of the Rights of Man, and that within the limits of their sovereignty, they take appropriate measures to ensure the faithful observance of those rights."

Court Charges Medical Hoax

SAN FRANCISCO (U) - Federal district court here has issued an injunction barring from interstate commerce 13 electrical devices used in what the government called "one of the greatest medical hoaxes we have ever encountered."
The injunction, sought by the U. S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), was issued Tuesday with the consent of the Electronic Medical Foundation of San Francisco, manufacturer of the devices.
FDA Commissioner Charles W. Crawford said in Washington it is hoped the injunction "will put an end to a nationwide system of quackery which constitutes one of the greatest medical hoaxes we have ever encountered."
Crawford said the machines claimed to be of use in treating ailments ranging from cancer to sore throat - have been proven "worthless for any therapeutic purpose" by exhaustive FDA tests.
The agency said some 5,000 of the machines - called by such names as "oncillotron" and "despolar chair" - are "now in the offices of various fringe practitioners of healing throughout the country."

JERUSALEM (U) - Jordan rejected a United Nations invitation Wednesday for high level talks with Israel to discuss their armistice problems.

HOLYWELL, England (U) - They're losing a party at the Ferry Boat Inn tonight for a woman who, if she exists, is 923 years old.
And spectral though she may be, at least nine of the guests are hoping the old girl will put in an appearance.
The ghost, known as the "White Lady of Holywell," is reputed to have haunted the inn since the middle of the 11th century.
Traditionally, she appears at midnight each March 17.
A. D. Cornell, of the Society for Psychic Research, claims he talked with her last year. She told him, he said, that her name was Juliet Tousey and that she hanged herself in 1050, at the age of 19, because of an unhappy love affair with a woodcutter named Thomas Zoul.
Cornell and eight other members of the society will be waiting for her tonight.
If she shows up, they will go into action with a battery of infrared cameras, a tape recorder and a spectroscope. They want to find out what little girls are made of when they're nine centuries old.
Landlord Jack Rodd arranged to stay open and serve drinks for an extra hour.
He told reporters: "I hope the White Lady doesn't come to the party. If the ghost appears, my missus will disappear, and I need her help to run this place."

Corinne Calvet Awarded Divorce

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (U) - Actor John Bromfield said she "should take up sports instead of motherhood." French actress Corinne Calvet testified in obtaining a divorce from him.
Bromfield didn't want any children, she said yesterday, adding: "He said I couldn't take a chance with my career and leave the screen for a year to have a baby. . . . He said I could have no children because I was not a competent housewife and therefore he was sure I would not make a capable mother. I was embarrassed because all our friends thought we should have children and I didn't know how to explain why we didn't."
The court awarded her alimony payments of 10 per cent of Bromfield's gross income if it totals more than \$20,000 a year, her share of community property and restored her maiden name.
The couple married in Boulder City, Nev., in 1948.

Radioactive Fish Sought In Japan

TOKYO (U) - Health authorities with Geiger counters prowled Tokyo markets today for radioactive fish sold by a trawler which was showered with ash from an atomic weapons test in the Pacific Bikini Island area.
Most of the catch was recovered but the price of tuna tumbled 40 per cent.

Icy Streets Cause Mishap

Icy streets and highways, probably the worst this winter, greeted early morning drivers today following a night of intermittent snow that froze as it struck the ground.
A West Coast Freight Lines truck and trailer failed to negotiate the turn at Esplanade and Alameda, the trailer skidding over the sidewalk and knocking out a piece of the concrete railing.
At Third and Main a pickup operated by Fred Priest, 3111 Emerald, was unable to stop and crashed into the side of a California-Canadian Express semi-trailer driven by Charles Chamberlin, Reedley, California.
Another car-truck mishap occurred at the intersection of Klamath Avenue and South Sixth when a Ford truck loaded with prestolite and operated by Andrew H. Bussman, 2095 Del Moro, sideswiped a Hurrey Cab driven by Charles Matlock. The cab suffered a dented left front fender.

Angry Mother Kills Child

SPRING CITY, Pa. (U) - Police said today a young mother, charged with homicide, told them she beat her 9-month-old daughter to death because she was "mad at it."
Police Chief John Hanbury said Mrs. Phyllis Seely, 21, who lives in a local trailer camp, called a taxi to give herself up after the beating.
He said he accompanied her to her trailer home and found the baby, Dawn, still alive. The child died six hours later in a hospital.
Police said the infant apparently had been beaten over the head with a hammer. A necktie was knotted around her neck. Hanbury also said Mrs. Seely told him she knocked the child's head against a wall of the trailer because her crying made her "nervous."
Another daughter, about 2, was found unharmed in the trailer. Mrs. Seely's husband Richard was at work at the time.

Theft, Forgery Cases Go Before Circuit Court

Claude Lee Thomas, 21, whose inordinate fondness for tomato juice is reported to have caused him to run afoul of the law, pleaded not guilty Wednesday when he appeared before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg on a charge of burglary in a railroad car.
Thomas, who is represented by Attorney P. K. Puckett, was arrested by railroad police after he was alleged to have stolen a case of tomato juice from a Southern Pacific freight car. Officers said he had consumed a half gallon of juice before they took him into custody.
George Bevel, 51, charged with passing a bogus \$20 check at Gigger's Market, pleaded guilty to a forgery charge Wednesday. Judge Vandenberg deferred passing sentence until he receives a report on the defendant from the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Bevel was represented by Attorney William Ganong Jr. Bevel told the court he had served a term in Oregon State Prison for possession of stolen property.

List Shows New Defense Weapons

WASHINGTON (U) - An official Defense Department catalogue of weapons shows the United States has at least 18 types of guided missiles in use, in production or under test.
This fact cropped up, probably unintentionally, when a department production report was included yesterday among a file of routine daily orders and communications given to newsmen. The report bore no secrecy label.
The report also identified several new types of jet planes, about which department public relations officers had been allowed to say little or nothing.
Among the guided missiles mentioned were these:
Antiaircraft: the Nike (Army); the Terrier and Talos, two models (Navy).
Bombardment (surface - to - surface): Corporal (Army); Matador and Shark (Air Force); Regulus (Navy).
Plane - to - ground attack: the Dove, Petrel, Gorgon V (Navy); the Rascal B3 (Air Force).
Plane - against plane: Falcon F98 (Air Force); three models of the Sparrow, the Oriole, the Sidewinder (navy).
The Army's Nike, the report showed, has gone through seven stages of redesigning since the first model of the antiaircraft weapon was tested about two years ago. The new A7 model seemed to be what Gen. Matthew Ridgway, Army chief of staff, referred to Monday when he told a Senate Appropriations subcommittee that the Army would extend its antiaircraft capability with a "markedly improved missile to be used with essentially the same ground equipment as the present Nike system."

Tax Evader To Be Sentenced

ST. LOUIS (U) - Sentencing has been set for Monday for Paul Dillon, personal friend of former President Truman, who was convicted yesterday of attempting to evade \$1,799 in income taxes for 1950-51.
An all-male jury took just 30 minutes to return its verdict against the 76-year-old St. Louis attorney who once was a campaign manager for Truman.
Dillon, who will remain free on bond until the sentencing, was named in a two-count federal indictment last November. He faces a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine on each count.
He explained why he did not testify in his own behalf during the two-day trial by telling newsmen: "When you're 76 years old they can't hurt you."

Among new aircraft, the report listed the F104 Lockheed interceptor, the F105 Republic fighter-bomber and a version of the giant transport carrier-cargo C124, powered by turbo-prop (propellers driven by jet turbines similar to the conventional jet "thrust" power plant).
