The office will be one of seven in the nation being established under the department's new decentralization program. Work now being done in Washington will be moved to regional offices under the program, Postmaster General Summerfield said.

SALEM (AP) — A statewide test of county and city air defense warning centers will be held Thursday, state civil defense headquarters announced Tuesday.

Daily tests, involving the key point warning centers at Portland, Eugene, Medford, Pendleton and The Dalles, now are being held. Thursday's tests will reach down to the county and city levels.

Santiam River Construction Set

PORTLAND (AP) — The Bonneville Power Administration awarded a contract for a \$128,601 substation on the Santiam River near Lyons Tuesday to City Electric Co., and

Nottingham Construction Co., of Boise, Idaho.

The plant, to be energized next August, will provide new interconnections with Mountain States Power Co. and the Benton-Lincoln Electric Cooperative. It also will provide peak capacity for serving

power loads for Salem and the Upper Willamette Valley area, BPA said.

DRIVERS LICENSE

TOKYO (AP) — Japan's Crown Prince Akihito got his driver's license today—but he probably won't be seen behind the wheel of a car on Tokyo streets. Imperial household spokesmen said the crown prince will drive a car only as a hobby, probably in resort areas during vacation trips.
