

Department Of Agriculture Said Newest Probe Target

WASHINGTON (AP)—Agents of the Department of Agriculture (D-A) have been quietly checking the Department of Agriculture and Secretary Benson's agency soon may be brought under the Wisconsin senator's fire.

McCarthy, now on a Midwest speaking tour, has announced he wants to make a farm speech in the Senate.

It may be the kickoff in a campaign against some of the aspects of the flexible farm price support program put before Congress by Benson with President Eisenhower's support.

Investigation by the staff of McCarthy's subcommittee of alleged Communists who may be in the department could blossom at almost any time into hearings like those conducted into some of the Army's affairs.

Benson's action in announcing a cut in dairy price supports from the present level of 90 per cent to 75 per cent on April 1 has angered McCarthy and many of his dairy farm constituents in Wisconsin.

McCarthy's attitude toward Benson—as expressed to the Wisconsin senator's friends—is that the cabinet member is a fine, upstanding gentleman whose ideas and speeches are likely to cost the Republicans Senate and House seats in the Middle West.

The net loss by Republicans of one Senate seat would bring Democratic control of that body and cost McCarthy his chairmanship of the Senate's permanent investigating committee. The Wisconsin senator has plans to campaign extensively for Republican candidates running in the November election.

In the farm speech he hopes to make soon in the Senate, McCarthy is expected to call for a flexible system of price supports ranging from 85 to 110 per cent of parity. Parity is a standard said by law to give farmers a fair return for their products in relation to the things they buy.

Major field crops are supported under the present law at 90 per cent of parity, but Benson had proposed a sliding scale ranging from 75 to 90 per cent.

McCarthy claims to have won from Benson at private conferences of the senators on the farm program a concession that there is little likelihood that any of these supports would go down lower than about 83 or 84 per cent.

The Wisconsin senator proposed that instead of asking Republican candidates to go back to the voters with a 75-to-90 per cent program more attractive by supporting an 85-to-110 per cent program.

ELENA'S SHRIMP FRITTERS

Sift flour before measuring. Use level measurements for all ingredients. Measure into a medium-size saucepan—

1/2 cup water

2 tablespoons butter

Bring rapidly to a boil, then add all at once—

1/2 cup sifted Sperry Drifted Snow "Home-Perfected" Enriched Flour

Stir vigorously until mixture forms a ball and leaves sides of pan. Remove from heat and add—

2 eggs, beaten

Beat, with spoon or rotary beater, until batter is smooth and thick. Then stir in—

Drop mixture by small spoonfuls into heated shallow fat. Fry, basting now and then with the hot fat, until browned on both sides (about 2 minutes cooking on each side). Drain and serve with or without a sauce. Allow 2 fritters for each serving. Makes 6 servings or 12 fritters.

*About 3/4 cup melted shortening, or oil in an 11x7 inch skillet is sufficient. Fat should be hot, about 375 degrees.

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VARIATION: If desired, the shrimp fritter mixture may be spread over the bottom of a 10x6x2 inch baking dish. (Grease bottom of the dish only; do not grease the sides.) Bake for 20 to 25 minutes in a preheated hot oven, 400°, or until mixture is "puffed" and golden brown. Cut into squares and serve with creamed peas or other vegetable. Serve immediately as, like a soufflé, the mixture will "fall" upon standing.
