Dusette Wrecks Pedersen But Disqualified in Riotous Scrap

When Georges Dusette finished his wrecking job last night at the Armory, the only similarity between Eric Pedersen, the sneering Samson, and the biblical strongman was his long hair.

The Pedersen who blubbered with pain on the dressing room table after the bout was a long cry from the strutting, smirking scion who answered the first bell against the French-Canadian powerhouse.

Both used their famous full nelsons last night—but there was a difference. Dusette answered the second bell after Pedersen scored the first fall with a full nelson in 14:45 of the one-hour bout. Pedersen will be lucky if he gets out of bed this morning after Dusette showed him how the full nelson should work.

LOSES BOUT

Dusette lost the second fall and the bout by disqualification when he refused to release the full nelson. But he wasn't interested in winning the match. All he wanted to do was clobber the vain weight-lifter.

Bill Aimed At Busch

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) went to bat before a Senate judiciary subcommittee Thursday in support of his bill aimed at ousting August Busch, owner of the St. Louis Cardinals, from pro baseball.

There was no indication in advance of the hearing as to how much backing Johnson had gained for his legislation, which would make baseball clubs owned by beer or liquor interests subject to the nation's anti-trust laws.

Senatorial sources said the fate of the legislation apparently rests on the case Johnson builds up. The Colorado senator is president of the Class A Western League.

Johnson was the only witness scheduled for Thursday's hearing before the subcommittee headed by Sen. Langer (R-ND). Busch and baseball commissioner Ford Frick had been invited but were excused. They will appear later.

Wheelchair Event Set

WASHINGTON (AP) — An international competition in a dozen athletic events, to be held abroad next summer, will bring crippled ex-servicemen from 22 nations into competition.

Announcement of the Wheelchair Sports Festival was made Thursday by Harold Russell, vice president of the World Veterans Fund, Inc.

Russell, a handless war veteran, said the time and place for the competition will be set later, but that the events will bring together paralyzed veterans representing 112 veterans' organizations.

Porter Tops NW Scorers

Two Northwest collegiate basketball scoring machines hammered the hoop for more than 600 points in the 1953-54 season, and in the final tally Don Porter of Portland State beat out Wade Halbrook of Oregon State for top honors.

Porter stacked up 824 tallies to Halbrook's 614 and had a shorter schedule in which to make his bid for the leadership. He averaged a fraction less than 25 points in 25 games while Halbrook had 30 tills in which to build his total.

NOT CLOSE

Neither of these tally makers came close to the 918 piled up last season by Johnny O'Brien of Seattle University, and both were behind the 1953 mark of Washington's Bob Houbregs, who seconded Johnny O. with 846.

Norm Hubert of Pacific moved into third place with 578, topping Joe Pehanick of Seattle U. by five. Close also were the next two places, Ted Schadevitz of Eastern Oregon College closing with 546 to edge College of Idaho's R. C. Owens by six.

BENNINK TENTH

Nine of the 10 leaders finished above 500. Phil Jordan of Whitworth, Jackie May of St. Martin's, and Jerry Vermillion of Gonzaga rounding out the group. Tenth man was Ron Bennink of Washington State, who had 483.

Porter set the pace in field goal production, hitting from the field 235 times. Halbrook was top man at the free throw line, the 7 foot 3 inch ace of the Northern Division champions dropping in 178 gift points.

Johnson Outpoints Andrews

CHICAGO (AP) — A light heavyweight title showdown between Harold Johnson and champion Archie Moore was shaping up today for the challenger's hometown, Philadelphia, this summer.

Johnson, 25, snapped out of a first-round knockdown to win a split decision over impressive Paul Andrews, 24, of Buffalo in Chicago Stadium last night.

In winning his 48th start in 53 bouts, Johnson had trouble working into Andrews, who at 6-3, towered over him and outranged him in punches by several inches. Andrews, an ex-paratrooper, outwaged Johnson by three pounds, 179 to 176.

Aside from the mandatory eight count knockdown in the opener of the nationally televised 10-rounder Johnson was a clever, sharp boxer who threw four times as many punches as his somewhat cautious opponent and handled himself up to expectations of his No. 1 ranking as a contender.

Andrews, displaying a deft left hook and sneaky right, crashed home the left in the first and Johnson went down.

"I thought it was a right," Johnson said afterwards. "Those ring lights seemed awfully bright and I had to look up to that tall Andrews. The lights blinded me."

Johnson's date with Moore, whom he has met four times, may be in late June or early July.

"Moore still wants a \$100,000 guarantee," said Johnson.

Truman Gibson, secretary of the International Boxing Club, said the match was in the making for Philadelphia.

Larry Jansen Healthy, Ready

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Tall Larry Jansen, who turned a serious mishap into a near miracle the year he came up to the major leagues, is "knocking on wood" and hoping for a successful season with the New York Giants.

For the first time since 1951, the 190-pound, 6-foot-3 right hander from Forest Grove, Ore., is not suffering from any ailments.

Last year a sore arm hampered his efforts and his 11 victories and 16 defeats was by far his most unfortunate year since he broke into baseball with Salt Lake City in 1940.

In 1952 Jansen's back gave him trouble and he edged in with an 11-11 record in marked contrast to his brilliant 23-11 the year before.

just gone to the Giants, that his career was almost wrecked. He was pitching against Cleveland at Tucson. Bob Feller lined a Jansen pitch and it nailed Jansen full in the face, breaking his cheek bone in several places.

A 30-game winner the year before with San Francisco, things were dark. But Jansen came off the shelf and amazed the experts, and delighted the Giants, by racking up 21 victories while losing but five games that year.

FEEL GOOD

"This spring I feel pretty good. No troubles at all," Jansen confided, adding, "but I'm knocking on wood."

In his first appearance on the mound, Jansen stopped a Cleveland threat with two strikeouts and no hits and got credit for the Giants 10-9 victory. On his next time out, again against the Indians, he toiled nicely and kept out of serious trouble, the Giants again winning.

At 33, Jansen admittedly must take things a little slower. He says he doesn't expect to be able to pitch the usual every four days, and his once dazzling curve ball may not be as effective as in the past.

HIT IN FACE

It was in one of the first spring games of 1947, when Jansen had



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
