## New Development For Atom Use Seen By Scientists

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Van Zandt (R-Pa.) said today American scientists have broken through a logjam in the development of hydrogen and atomic power, and that the achievement points to accelerated development of both weapons and civilian power.

He gave no details. His prediction followed these disclosures:

1. Members of the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee confirmed that a preliminary hydrogen explosion March 1 in the Pacific was three or four times heavier than scientists expected. Van Zandt estimated its power at 600 times that of the Hiroshima atom bomb, the first one used in warfare.
2. Informed sources who declined to be named said the United States now is stockpiling hydrogen bombs that could be delivered anywhere in the world. This followed a statement by Rep. W. Lister Collins (R-N.Y.) Tuesday night that this country has a deliverable hydrogen bomb. President Eisenhower asked at his news conference about Cole's statement, reserved comment until next week. Cole is chairman of the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee, and Van Zandt is a member.
3. Military officials gave an Atomic Energy subcommittee yesterday what members called a "highly optimistic" review of developments in atomic energy for such weapons purposes as propelling ships and aircraft.

It was after this meeting that Van Zandt said in an interview that an unspecified logjam has been broken and rapid progress is prospective.

"I am more enthusiastic now than ever before about the possibilities," he said.

Meanwhile, two other committee members, Representatives Durham (D-NC) and Price (D-Ill.) called upon the Atomic Energy Commission to tell the public all it can about the Pacific hydrogen blast.

The new bomb, Durham said, "is such a horrible thing it's best to tell the world about it." Price said he saw no reason to bar a quick announcement. The AEC gave no indication it would have a statement soon.

Durham estimated the blast at "several times" the strength of the first hydrogen explosion on Nov. 1, 1952.

The power of the first hydrogen blast has not been officially reported. Van Zandt said it was equal to between 2½ and 3 million tons of TNT—compared with 20,000 tons for the Hiroshima blast. Van Zandt said the latest hydrogen explosion in the Bikini-Eniwetok area measured between 12 and 14 million tons. He gave this additional description:

1. The explosion shot a nuclear cloud more than 17 miles into the air.
2. The shock was felt at Kwajalein Island, 176 miles away.
3. A fall-out of nuclear dust was reported from an inhabited island 330 miles away, but it was in harmless quantities.
4. The blast was set off from a 150-foot tower and was preliminary to a larger hydrogen explosion scheduled later in the current series of Pacific tests.

Van Zandt said that "as a layman and by using my imagination, I can imagine our present rate of research leading to the development of a hydrogen weapon of 100 million tons in power."

## Committee Debates Red Outlaw Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The first legislative hearings on outlawing the Communist party in the United States were called today by a House Judiciary subcommittee.

Eleven members of the House were on hand to argue the merits of as many bills to strip the Communist party of its political label and brand it a subversive clique without legal standing.

While recommendations to outlaw the Communist party have been made on numerous occasions, this was the first time a legislative committee of Congress has formally undertaken hearings on specific bills.

The House Un-American Activities Committee, in its last year-end report, withheld recommendation on this point pending outcome of final court review of the findings of the Subversive Activities Control Board.

The Board, after nearly three years of hearings, last year ruled the Communist party was a subversive organization. The finding of the board has been appealed to the courts.

The board's findings, however, gave impetus to attempts in Congress to enact a law to outlaw the party, and 11 House members have sponsored separate bills to this end—two of them Republican, the rest Democrats.

The Republican sponsors are Rep. Hagen of Minnesota and Rep. Clardy of Michigan.

The Democrats include Rep. Martin Dies of Texas, chairman of the first Committee on Un-American Activities in the House.

The others are Rep. Walter (Pa.), senior Democrat on the Un-American Activities Committee; and Representatives Boggs (La.), Bennett (Fla.), King (Calif.), Staggers (W.Va.), Wilson (Tex.), and Madden (Ind.) and O'Brien (N.Y.).

## New Air Radar System Told

NEW YORK (AP) — An aviation company official says more than two dozen cities in the United States and Alaska will be equipped with a new radar setup to allow airport landings and takeoffs in a one-minute clip even in zero visibility.

Edward K. Foster, vice president of the Bendix Aviation Corp., said Wednesday the new radar development technically is capable of "landing any aircraft equipped for normal instrument flight regardless of visibility."

The equipment, Foster added, "will practically eliminate landing delays due to fog."

Another new development, Foster said, includes "video mapping"—electronically reproducing an area map on the radar screen which shows terrain hazards, airport runways and radio flight paths.

Use of the new radar will be worked out by aircraft operators and the civil aeronautics administration.

Foster said the new radar—developed at Bendix's Baltimore plant—actually will consist of two separate systems:

- ASR-3 (Airport surveillance radar) for control of air traffic from 20 to 80 miles from an airport.
- PAR-2 (Precision approach radar) for the final landing approach.

Foster said the first Bendix ASR-3 radar system now is being tested by the CAA at Baltimore Friendship International Airport and the initial installation of the PAR system is being tested at Philadelphia International Airport.

Cities slated to receive their first precision approach radar with installation of the new PAR-2 include Oakland, San Francisco, Portland, Ore., Seattle, Dallas, Houston and Anchorage, Alaska.

## Windy, Wet Over West

Windy, wet weather was the outlook for Western and Midwest areas Thursday. Mild, spring-like weather was in prospect for most of the eastern third of the country.

Light rain and snow fell throughout the Rocky Mountain region while light showers continued along the North Pacific Coast.

Rain or snow was predicted for North Central areas.

Although light rain was reported in sections of Texas and Oklahoma more dust storms were forecast for the Southwest. Heavy blowing dust continued during the night from New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle through Western and Central Kansas and Eastern Colorado. Visibility was reduced northward into the Dakotas. Winds of 50 m.p.h. were reported in the dust areas.

Temperatures were below freezing early Thursday in the Northern Rockies eastward along the Canadian border and over the Great Lakes region and Northern Appalachians.

Some early morning temperatures included 46 in St. Louis; 31 in Detroit; 45 in Memphis; 55 in Fort Worth; 53 in Kansas City; 43 in San Francisco; 33 in Seattle; 30 in Los Angeles; 33 in Milwaukee; 37 in Duluth, Minn., and 36 in Chicago.

## Reduced Freight Rates Upheld

WASHINGTON (AP) — West Coast railroads will be permitted to continue reduced rates adopted last June for North-South freight movements if the Interstate Commerce Commission follows recommendations of Examiner Marion Boat.

Boat said Wednesday his investigation showed the rail rates, established to meet trucker competition, were not unlawfully low. He rejected protests of San Francisco and Oakland Chambers of Commerce that the rates favored Los Angeles.

The reductions affected freight moving between the Los Angeles, San Francisco and Port Chicago, Calif., areas and the Portland and Seattle areas. They ranged from 28.5 cents to 63 cents a 100 pounds on all freight involving at least 30,000 pounds.

## Russia Gives Nod To Geneva

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union has announced its agreement with Western proposals to hold the April 26 Geneva conference on Far Eastern questions in the Palace of Nations and says Communist China, invited to sit in with the Big Four, also approves.

Publishing the Soviet announcement Thursday, the official Communist Party newspaper Pravda accused U. S. Secretary of State Dulles of reaching "groundless conclusions" when he accused Russia and Red China last Tuesday of delaying tactics which might put off the conference.

The Big Four foreign ministers agreed during their recent Berlin talks to sit down with the Peiping Communist regime in the Swiss capital to discuss a Korean peace treaty and a possible end to the war in Indochina. The Palace of Nations where the talks will be held is the old League of Nations building, now used by the United Nations.

The long delay in replying to suggestions by U. S. Ambassador to Moscow Charles E. Bohlen on "housekeeping" arrangements for the talks led Dulles to tell a news conference in Washington that the Geneva meeting might have to be put off because of what he called Soviet and Chinese delaying tactics.

## Washington Man Named To FCA

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Farm Board's naming of Robert Tootell, director of the Washington State Agriculture Extension Service, as governor of the Farm Credit Administration was approved by President Eisenhower Wednesday.

As the \$17,500-a-year head of the farm agency, Tootell will supervise the sprawling federal farm credit system, which includes 12 federal land banks, 1,100 national farm loan associations, 498 production credit associations, 12 federal intermediate credit banks, and 13 banks for cooperatives.

Tootell was with the Farm Credit Administration and the Federal Land Bank of Spokane from 1924 to 1943 when he became director of agricultural economics at Montana State College. Later he was director of the agriculture extension service in Montana and Washington.

He will become FCA governor April 1.

## One Killed In Air Mishap

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — An amphibious rescue plane landed here Thursday with six survivors and the body of one man killed in a crash landing of a crippled C-119 Flying Boxcar 100 miles east of Formosa.

The pilot and co-pilot landed the faltering plane safely at Taipei a few minutes later. It had developed engine trouble en route from Okinawa to Formosa.

Only minutes after they hit the water, the men who parachuted were picked up by an amphibious plane of the Chinese Nationalist Fighting air line.

No names were announced.
