Stocks WALL STREET NEW YORK (AP) — A strong recovery movement continued Thursday in the stock market for the second straight session. Gains were not very extensive, but they went to between 1 and 2 points at the best. Minus signs were almost all small and scattered.

Livestock CHICAGO LIVESTOCK CHICAGO (AP) — Producers sent in more hogs than had been expected Thursday and prices generally eased about 10 cents. Buyers paid \$25.50 to \$26.00 for most choice 180 to 230 pound butchers, going up to \$26.10 and \$26.15 for several loads and lots of choice types.

Grains CHICAGO GRAIN CHICAGO (AP) — An easy trend in wheat spread to the rest of the grain market before the close on the board of trade Thursday. Soybeans, up several cents at one time, lost just about all their early gains. Lard also retreated below the previous close after the March had set a new seasonal top. Feed grains dipped slightly below Wednesday's finish.

Bloodmobile Plans Told

Forty-five minutes of time and a pint of blood can save or prolong a life. This information comes from the American Red Cross bloodmobile staff that will be in Klamath County March 29-30. Anyone in reasonably good health, 18 through 59 years of age, may offer blood. Parental consent is required for unmarried minors. Minimum weight is 110 pounds. The only requirements are to refrain from eating eggs or fatty foods for at least four hours prior to donation.

GOP Ahead In Tax Row Demos Plan Last Fight

NEW YORK (AP) — The National Council of Churches, urging new safeguards for individual freedoms, wants a single U. S. House-Senate committee set up to investigate subversive activities. The council, representing 30 Protestant and orthodox denominations with 35 million members, declared Wednesday that there have been growing threats to individual rights in this country. It recommended eight changes to prevent what it termed "procedural abuses" by congressional committees.

U.S. Reports On Red POW's

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The United States formally reported to the United Nations Thursday that some 22,000 former soldiers of the North Korean and Chinese Communist armies had chosen "freedom over Communist tyranny" and had been released from prisoner of war status. The formal report was submitted by the U. S. mission to the U. N. acting for the United Nations command in Korea. The prisoners were released Jan. 23, but the American document was the first complete and official account received here of the action.
