Snipers Hit In Suez Zone

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — The British Embassy announced Friday that Egyptian snipers wounded two British officers in the Suez Canal zone and that one of the officers later died. The embassy said Maj. W. R. Burhill died of bullet wounds in the stomach and that Capt. I. Wilson was wounded in the shoulder. The attack occurred at El Bahlah airport, north of Ismailia. Two other incidents were reported Friday in the disputed Suez zone where two British soldiers were killed earlier this week, three others were wounded and two are missing. Earlier an Egyptian policeman was slain. In the other incidents Friday the embassy reported (1) five Egyptians fired sten guns at two British army vehicles in Fayd but no casualties were reported; (2) fifty minutes later an Egyptian threw a hand grenade into a British army vehicle at Suez but the passenger tossed it out before it exploded.

Rep. Bentley Recovering

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Alvin M. Bentley (R-Mich.) said Friday doctors have told him he will recover "100 per cent" from wounds suffered March 1 when Puerto Rican Nationalist fanatics sprayed the House of Representatives with bullets. Bentley, at a news conference in his room at Casualty Hospital, said he has been given "every assurance that there is no going to be anything, given time, that would be wrong with me." The 25-year-old multi-millionaire and former career diplomat who is serving his first term in the House said he will be a candidate for re-election in November.

Violent Winds Cause Death

DENVER (AP) — Violent winds that battered plains areas of Colorado and Wyoming for two days left in their wake Friday a victim. Mrs. Cora Pool, 76, who died from injuries she received when blown down on a Colorado Springs street. Three other Colorado Springs persons were injured Thursday when winds in the Pike's Peak region reached 84 miles an hour. The gusts there damaged trees and utility lines and whipped up dust that halted traffic on highways south and east of Colorado Springs. Mrs. Pool died of a fractured skull eight hours after the gales knocked her to the sidewalk while alighting from a bus. The others, two women and an aged man, suffered broken bones and head injuries. Winds slackened early Friday after the two-day assault which brought dust storms and heavy snowfall within miles of each other in the Colorado and Wyoming plains areas.

Pope Appears Before Crowd

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Pius XII appeared in public Friday for the first time since he became gravely ill two months ago. From the window of his Vatican apartment he blessed more than 30,000 persons cheering him from St. Peter's Square. The crowd was composed mostly of Italian Alpine veterans, here for their annual convention. Exactly as the 18-ton master bell of St. Peter's Basilica boomed the 12th stroke of the noon hour, the top floor window of the papal apartment opened and the white-clad, 78-year-old pontiff appeared in the window. A great shout went up from the throng, swelled by nuns and priests including a group from the North American Pontifical College.

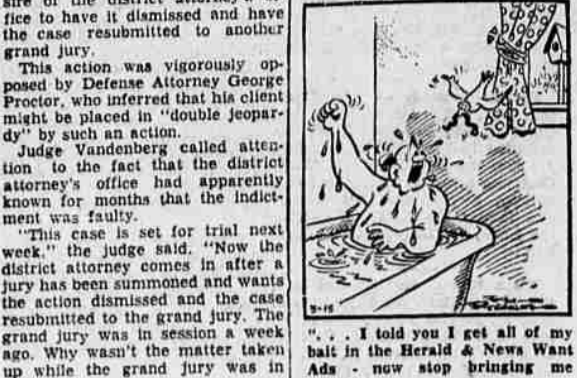
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Battle Wages On Indictment

Proposed dismissal of an old indictment under which a former Oregon State Prison inmate is now held in the County Jail was the subject of a legal battle Friday in Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg's court. The issue developed when Deputy District Attorney Robert Kerr asked the court to dismiss the indictment charging Joe D. Andrews, 28, with obtaining money and property under false pretenses. The true bill against Andrews was returned by a Klamath County Grand Jury on October 13, 1952. Kerr told the court the indictment was faulty and it was the desire of the district attorney's office to have it dismissed and have the case resubmitted to another grand jury. This action was vigorously opposed by Defense Attorney George Proctor, who inferred that his client might be placed in "double jeopardy" by such an action. Judge Vandenberg called attention to the fact that the district attorney's office had apparently known for months that the indictment was faulty. "This case is set for trial next week," the judge said. "Now the district attorney comes in after a jury has been summoned and wants the action dismissed and the case resubmitted to the grand jury. The grand jury was in session a week ago. Why wasn't the matter taken up while the grand jury was in session?" After hearing arguments by op-
