## With Martin Gone, Coleman Will Take Charge of New York Yanks

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — (NEA) — Rival American League managers feel that the loss of Billy Martin, Vic Raschi and Johnny Sain will hurt the Yankees performance-wise and as a morale factor.

If Mickey Mantle's knee is lardy in coming around, the World Champions may not have the early foot which a year ago outdistanced the Indians, White Sox and Red Sox before they had a chance to really warm up.

All hands admire Jerry Coleman, but believe that in the World Ser-

ies last fall Martin just arrived as a rip-snorting ballplayer. They are underestimating Coleman, however.

**HAPPY**  
Managers of the contenders are happy to be rid of Raschi, who usually beat them in the big ones. The Springfield Rifle was seven and two over the Indians the last two campaigns, for example, and it was the scholarly right-hander who stopped the Sox after the Bombers tacked a losing streak of nine onto a winning string of 13.

"I've lost three good men and until Mantle gets back on two sound legs, it's four," says Casey

Stengel. "And I'm not going to sit here and tell you I've improved myself in doing so. When you lose four stars, they have to be replaced, that is if you intend to go anywhere in particular."

**SIXTH**  
Bidding for his sixth straight pennant, Professor Stengel's principal task is taking up the slack.

Unless complications set in, Martin will not be missed as much as the challengers would like to believe. They completely overlook the fact that Coleman was the take charge guy who led the New York Americans to Manager Stengel's first three pennants. He was batting .405 in 11 games when the Marines recalled the flying ace two years ago.

Martin merely picked up where Coleman left off.

**HEAVIER**  
At 173, Coleman is eight pounds heavier than he was when he went away, remains an acrobat at second base and in the opening exhibition game belted the ball over the left field bleachers and out into Tampa Bay.

The amazing Phil Rizzuto is still the key to the infield and the Yankees, and at 33 the little shortstop looks and says he feels as well as ever.

## Giardello, Troy Talk Confident

NEW YORK (AP)—Boxer Joey Giardello and puncher Willie (No. 1) Troy talk tonight in a Madison Square Garden 10-rounder that has most everyone but the fighters puzzled over the outcome.

"I'll take him," said the cocky, 23-year-old Giardello. "That stand-up style of his is my dish, I'll outbox him."

"Giardello is a good boxer and I expect he'll stay back," said confident, 21-year-old Willie. "That's okay with me. I'll go after him. I can beat him."

Giardello has shown confidence in his punch for late and has been gunning for knockouts. His record is 48-10-5 with 19 kayos. He has been stopped twice — by Carey Mace and Harold Green in 1950.

A good all-around boxer, Giardello, ranked as the No. 2 middleweight contender, said he will win on "speed, faster hands, and experience."

Troy, ranked seventh, has knocked out his last seven opponents. The six-foot Washington Negro has a 26-1 record with 20 kayos to his credit. He was TKOed in eight rounds by Holly Mims a year ago. Since then he has stopped Bobby Boyd, Lee Sala, Terry Moore, Randy Sandy, Charley Williams, Tuzo Portuoguez and Moses Ward.

## Pirates Rap American Leaguers 5 Straight

President Warren Giles of the National League is getting help from an unexpected source in his plea to the senior circuit clubs to beat the American Leaguers in spring training games.

The league president undoubtedly was confident the Brooklyn Dodgers could do well but who could expect the hitherto impotent Pittsburgh Pirates to win five games in as many starts against American League teams?

Yet that's just what the Pirates can boast of after slamming four runs for an 8-4 victory over the Washington Senators yesterday.

The Pirates perfect record, combined with Brooklyn's 7-0 mark, is chiefly responsible for the National League's 27-30 edge over the American in interleague battles.

**HOME RUN**  
Frank Thomas, the Buc's leading slugger last year with 20 homers and 103 runs batted in, tagged Bob Porterfield for a home run in

the fourth inning yesterday. Before the frame was over, Dale Long and Toby Atwell also had homers, and newly acquired Sid Gordon slammed one out of the park to account for the winning margin in the seventh inning.

The Dodgers recorded their seventh interleague victory — and ninth straight over-all — by making the most of three singles for a 4-1 victory over the New York Yankees.

Meeting the Yanks for the first time since their unsuccessful try in last year's World Series, the Dodgers loaded the bases in the seventh and pushed across their runs on a fielder's choice, two bases on balls and Roy Campanella's long fly.

**STREAK CUT**  
Another winning streak was snapped when Freddie Marsh's ninth-inning home run brought the Chicago White Sox a 5-4 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics, cutting short a string of seven successes. Johnny Thompson blanked the A's over the last four innings as the Philadelphia suffered their first loss of the spring.

The Baltimore Orioles, like the Athletics regarded as second-division material once the regular season begins, continued to fly high with a 7-4 victory over the Cleveland Indians. Bobby Young was the hero, with a base-clearing triple in the seventh inning.

The New York Giants won their fifth in a row, knocking over the Chicago Cubs 8-6 behind home runs by Henry Thompson and Willie Mays.

The Cincinnati Redlegs beat St. Louis Cardinals 9-2. Johnny Temple rapped four singles to lead the Cincinnati attack.

Earl Torgeson, who no longer has to battle Eddie Waitkus for the Philadelphia Phillies first base job, put on a slugging show with two singles, a triple and a double in the Phil's 12-10 victory over Milwaukee in the second game of a doubleheader. He also scored two runs and batted in two more.

The pitching was much better in the Detroit Tigers 1-0 victory over the Boston Red Sox, however, as Steve Gromek, Frank Lary and Bob Miller teamed up to blank the Sox with eight hits.

## Senators Get Negro Warnings

WINTER GARDEN, Fla. (AP) — Washington Senators baseball officials reported a second warning to remove Negro players from their farm team training base here and said they will do it, although city officials insist they have imposed no racial ban.

The FBI investigating the incident, which began when a man drove up to the camp Wednesday and reportedly told Zinn Beck, General Manager of the Chattanooga Lookouts:

"I have those Negroes out by sundown and don't bring them back."

It was first reported the man was a uniformed policeman, but Ossie Bluge, director of the Washington farm system, said that was a mistake, that the man wore no uniform.

Joe Engel, president of the Chattanooga Lookouts, reported the second warning. He said an anonymous phone caller told him: "Get those Negroes out right away."

The seven Cuban Negroes, assigned to Charlotte, N.C., of the Class A South Atlantic League, were shifted to the parent Washington team's training base at nearby Orlando.

## Now Keed Wants Marciano

CHICAGO (AP) — Kid Gavilan is really throwing his weight around. He owns the welterweight title. He talks as if he had already taken the 160-pound crown from Bobo Olson, an issue he says he will settle with a knockout in Chicago stadium April 2.

And today he pictures himself against Rocky Marciano for the heavyweight championship.

"I very serious about fighting Marciano after winning middleweight title," the Keed says. "I skip the lightweights and go where big money is."

"Twenty years ago small fellows like myself fought big boys in ring, but today, no. I can lick that Marciano. My feet and legs good and fast and there is plenty of clever up here (pointing to his head). Marciano no hit me solid on chin. "That never happen to Gavilan. I have no fear Marciano who is no Louis or (Jack) Dempsey. I would go at him at 166 pounds."

Just for the record, the only little man to beat a big man for the heavyweight crown was Bob Fitzsimmons. At 167, he knocked out James J. Corbett, 183, in the 14th round back in 1897.

## Eagles Cheap In Tourney

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Eagles were almost common and birdies were a dime a dozen Friday as 39 two-man professional teams and one amateur duet teed off in the second 18-hole round of the \$15,000 International Four-ball Golf Tournament.

Julius Boros, former National Open champion from Mid Pines, N.C., and E. J. (Dutch) Harrison, the Ardmore, Okla., veteran, each registered an eagle in Thursday's opening round as they fired a best ball score of 62. That was 10 under par for the Normandy Shores course.
