

Lecture Plans Announced

A world traveler and lecturer of wide experience has been secured by the First Church of Christ, Scientist, to deliver a free public lecture in Fremont School auditorium, 715 High, Tuesday, March 23, at 8 p.m.

The lecturer is Dr. Archibald Carey, C.S.B., of Detroit, Michigan, a member of the Christian Science Board of Lectureship. He will speak on the subject, "Christian Science: How Scienti-

fic Prayer Can Help You." Dr. Carey received the degrees of A.B. and LL.B. from the University of Michigan and LL.D. from Principia College. He entered the legal profession in Detroit, eventually becoming the senior member of a firm engaged largely in the practice of corporation law.

After an extensive investigation of various religions and philosophies, according to Dr. Carey, he became convinced that Christian Science is the most effective healing method.

While traveling in different countries, Dr. Carey realized what he termed a "world-wide need for what Christian Science offers," and, deciding he could be of greater service in the practice of Christian Science, he retired from his law practice. In 1931 he became an authorized teacher of Christian Science.

Since 1946 he has lectured on Christian Science in many countries, from Alaska to Argentina, from Europe to South Africa. The public is invited to attend his Klamath Falls lecture.

Grain Loans Explained

Farmers are reminded, that to be in a position to obtain price support on their 1954 grain crops, they must be able, either to present to the county office a negotiable warehouse receipt on the commodity, or to satisfy the county committee that it is stored on the farm in an eligible storage structure, states County Extension Agent C. A. Henderson.

Eligible farm storage is storage that is safe for the commodity as determined by the county committee. Barns, sheds, etc., can be converted into safe farm storage. Loans are available to eligible borrowers for new farm construction who can comply with the following requirements:

1. An eligible borrower is any producer; either tenant, landlord, or owner operator, who produces, wheat, barley, oats, rye or cover crop seed.

2. Eligible structures are those meeting the requirements for eligible storage under the CCC price support programs.

3. Repayment: To be repaid in four equal installments beginning one year after loan is disbursed. Extension provided in case of crop failure. Interest is four per cent.

4. Amount of loan: 45 cents per bushel capacity or 80 per cent of the cost of construction, whichever is the least.

5. Applications for this loan to be made at the county ASC office before June 30, 1954.

The full cost of new grain storage can be deducted from Federal Income Tax over a five-year period. The amortization provision also applies to alteration or remodeling of a grain storage structure that increases the capacity of the structure for grain storage. Previously, and for other construction, the amortization had to be spread over the useful life of the building.

Internal Revenue Wants More Help

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service says it wants manpower to cope with citizens who owe more than three billion dollars in overdue taxes.

Deputy Revenue Commissioner O. Gordon Dalk has told the House Appropriations Committee the service is recruiting 1,141 more enforcement officers for a stepped-up collection drive. Dalk's testimony was made public Friday.

The directors elected L. J. Horton of Klamath Falls to the office of president for 1954. Serving with him will be Vancil A. Withers, Paisley, vice president, and H. E. Hamaker, Klamath Falls, secretary-treasurer.

More than 100 members and guests attended the meeting.

Gun, Fish Reel Sale Planned

SACRAMENTO, March 22 — Director Seth Gordon of the California Department of Fish and Game today announced that more than 60 firearms and a dozen rods and reels confiscated from law-breaking hunters and fishermen will be auctioned off March 26 at the Department's Redding office.

The equipment was seized and turned over to the agency by judges assessing fish and game law violators.

Prospective bidders will be able to inspect the weapons and gear at 627 Cypress Street, Redding, from 10 A.M. to noon, and from 2 P.M. to 4 P.M., March 24 and March 25. The auction will start at 10 A.M., Friday, March 26.

Inventory sheets describing the rifles, shotguns, rods and reels are available at the Cypress Street address.
