McCall Surprise Candidate

A surprise entry seemed to have the inside track for the Klamath Union High School coaching job when the school board met with the advisory committee last night to mull over 27 applicants for the job—and there's still more to come.

The surprise entry was Paul McCall, last year's backfield coach and head basketball coach.

Persistent rumors said McCall wasn't interested in the post and the main street talk seemed to be true up to noon yesterday. But McCall threw his hat in the ring eight hours before the initial meeting to pick a successor for Bob Henderson, who recently resigned to go into teaching and counseling work.

McCall told school officials if he were given the job he would ask Duane Simmons, successful wrestling coach, to be his assistant.

Early discussion, although still very unofficial, seemed to lean toward the McCall-Simmons team to lead the Pelicans in the 1954 grid season.

CALLING MEETING

Arnold Gralapp, city schools superintendent, said all the candidates will probably be in the race by Wednesday and called a meeting for next Monday night.

At that time, the school board will have screened the candidates and Gralapp told the advisory committee the list would probably be cut down to a "half dozen finalists."

Part of the advisory committee, consisting of fathers of senior and ex-players and long-time Pelican fans, were in favor of "going out" for a coach—but the big majority was plainly in favor of McCall, whose ticket seems to be strong with Simmons as his assistant.

OUTSIDE

Two others on the current KUHS coaching staff — Dick Vallanor and John McGinnis—are seeking the job. The rest are from the outside.

Art Kirkland and Bob Smith, assistant football coaches at Oregon Tech, also have their bids in for the position.

Other outstanding candidates include Norm Newman, ex-Oregon State and six years coach at Aberdeen, Wash. High School; Bill Abbe, KUHS and University of Oregon graduate who has coached at Hood River and Southern Oregon College and is now in the service; Gene Allison, four years coach at Ashland High School; and Brad Ecklund, ex-Oregon football great with five years experience as a player in the National Professional Football League.

Others include Vernell Neese, University of Idaho, head line coach Moscow High School; Dick Sutherland, ex-The Dalles High coach; Chace Anderson, Idaho, five years at Pocatello High, currently at Everett, Wash.; Lawrence Christensen, coach at Concorde, Wash., from 1948; Ed M. Stricherz, South Dakota, 15 years high school coaching experience in South Dakota and Washington, currently at Enumclaw, Wash.

Craig Currie, Washington State, currently in the Air Force; Tom Farry, WSC, five years high school coaching in Langley and Clarkston, Wash.; Norman Pollock, College of Puget Sound, four years high school coaching experience; Hjalmer Anderson, University of Washington, three years at the University of British Columbia; John Blaser, Linfield, three years at Sheridan, Ore.; Richard Campbell, University of Illinois, in the service; George King, Central Washington College of Education, four years experience.

Walter Kindred, Washington, 11 years high school coaching experience, the last three at Hood River; R. L. McPadden, OSC and Oregon, the last six years at Ilwaco, Wash.; Donald Megale, ex-OSC tennis star now in the service; Royal Morrison, West Montana College and University of Montana, 10 years high school coaching experience in Montana and Oregon; Robert Morrow, Arnold College, Conn., four years at Maclaren School, Woodburn, Ore.; and Roy Thompson, Washington, one year at Benson High in Portland, two years in Astoria.

The advisory committee named Ed Bell as its president and discussed the formation of a Dad's Club, modeled after successful organizations at Grant and Jefferson high schools in Portland.

KANSAS CITY — The West all-stars scored a routine victory in the Shriner's annual East-West basketball game Monday night but an unorthodox maneuver by Rio Grande's New Oliver overshadowed the players' activities.

FOULS

The second was assessed after he had thrown his coat on the floor and rushed onto the court with another protest.

Heavyweight Champion Mischievous

CROSSINGER'S, N.Y.—(NEA)—The heavyweight champion of the world is now one of the Catskills' own. Rocky Marciano has gone the full cycle from lasagna and spaghetti to chopped chicken liver and borscht with sour cream. They are his dish.

The Italian even has picked up a new vocabulary to jibe with this borscht circuit resort area.

What do you do in the locker room before a fight when you're along with Charlie Goldinan and Al Weill, Rocky?

"Oh," he schmoozes, "we kibitz a bissel."

Translated, it means they shoot the breeze.

"I ever tell you how I became a fighter?" Rocky breezes along. "There was this sergeant from Texas in our company, and he wanted to know if there was a mensch (translation: man) in the whole outfit."

"When I got back to Brockton, Mass., and stayed in the amateurs, Mom yelled at me, 'Rocky

you've been fighting, haven't you?'

"No, I haven't, Mom. What makes you think that?"

"Rocky," she answered, "your nose is getting flatter."

Marciano's courtship of his wife, Barbara, started after he saw her at a dance. He followed her home to find out where she lived.

"She was with a bigger fellow," he recalls, "so I couldn't very well cut in."

What's the matter, Rocky, were you afraid of him?

"No, just cautious."

Al Weill, when he first took over Rocky, brought him to a Jewish wedding and taught him to make this introduction to everybody he met: "Glad to meet you, meshuganah Kopf (crazy head)."

It was after the 12th round of the first Walcott fight in Philadelphia, where he won the title, that Weill jumped into the ring between rounds and told him, "Rocky, you're losing the fight. You've got to do something quick, or next year you'll be training at Sukman's instead of Grossinger's."

Ask him what happened in the first round, and Rocky responds,

"Oh, he just hit me, and I fell on my tushy (derriere)."

What was your immediate reaction, Rocky?

"With all my friends there, I felt awfully embarrassed."

In the return go at Chicago, it was Marciano who put Walcott down in the first round with one punch, leading to this question:

"Rocky, you hit him with the right uppercut flush. Why'd you have to sock with the left when he was already gone?"

"I just wanted to help him down."

One of the champ's great satisfactions was being invited to the White House for lunch.

Was it the first time you ever saw the President, Rocky?

"Naw," he answers in his broad Boston "ah" and a typical wrinkle of the brow. "He once reviewed our regiment in Europe, but I never got close to him. It sure was great over the luncheon table to say, 'Please pass the salt, Ike.'"

If it sounds like a mischievous Rocky who's encamped in the Catskills, it is. He's only got to fight Ezzard Charles June 17.

Olson, Gavilan Confident

CHICAGO — The way the talk is flowing, you might get the idea Kid Gavilan and Bobo Olson are skipping their April 2 match to take on other opponents.

Certainly, the latest tidbits coming from their respective camps give no indication that either champion is concerned about the outcome of their Chicago Stadium bout for Olson's middleweight crown.

In what amounted to a two-day conversational marathon in Chicago last week, welterweight champ Gavilan and his trainer, Mundito Medina, dismissed the Olson fight as in the bag and pointed for Rocky Marciano.

As soon as he gives Olson a good licking, declared Gavilan, he aims to present his 154 pounds, and as much more as he can muster, to Marciano. This will result in the transfer of Rocky's heavyweight title to himself, said the Kid.

Now comes Olson's Manager, Sir Flattery, with word that he and his tiger are eagerly awaiting a big-money bout with Joey Giardello, who attracted considerable attention in whaling Willie Troy Friday.

We are anxious to accept Giardello's challenge," said Flattery, "but we want to prolong that fight until next January. Otherwise, Bobo will be defending his middleweight title mostly to pay taxes."

"We have no doubts about the outcome of this fight. I've seen Gavilan have trouble with ordinary welterweights."

Bobo lets his manager do most of the talking but has gone on record himself with "I'm not worrying about the fight."

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Final Balloting Puts Kentucky Atop Poll

NEW YORK — Kentucky's unbeaten basketball team, which refrained from tournament competition this year, came out ahead of the two national tournament winners, LaSalle and Holy Cross, in the final Associated Press ranking poll of the 1953-54 season today.

The Kentucky Wildcats, topping 71 of the 138 ballots cast by sports writers and broadcasters throughout the nation, captured the No. 1 ranking by the very small margin of 32 points from LaSalle's Explorers, the newly crowned National Collegiate Athletic Assn. champions.

Holy Cross, the surprise winner of the National Invitation Tournament, was a strong third, with Indiana, the 1953 NCAA champion and a strong preseason favorite, fourth.

FINAL COUNT

The final count, on the basis of 10 points for each first-place ballot, nine for second, eight for third, etc., gave Kentucky 1,110 points and LaSalle 1,078. Holy Cross drew 914 points and Indiana 835.

By finishing on top, Kentucky retained the spot it had held in 12 of 16 weekly polls throughout the season. Indiana, tabbed as the likely winner in the preseason poll, held onto the No. 1 spot for two weeks before suffering its first defeat. Duquesne moved to the front for a couple of weeks late in the season, then ran into two setbacks and dropped behind again.

Kentucky won 25 straight games during the regular season, including a playoff with Louisiana State for the Southeastern Conference championship, but declined to enter the NCAA Tournament, for which it qualified automatically. The reason was that three post-graduate players, eligible for conference competition, were not eligible under NCAA regulations.

INFLUENCE

The influence of postseason tournament results on the voting was seen in LaSalle's rise to second place at the finish. The Explorers, in and out of the first 10 during the regular season and at times unable to muster enough points to make the first 20, moved up to sixth place a week ago when they entered the NCAA semifinals. After whipping Penn State and Bradley soundly to win the title, they jumped up to second.
