State Labor Survey Ended

SALEM — Thirty-three violations of the State Wage and Hour law by Klamath Falls business establishments were revealed in a Bureau of Labor survey just completed, Commissioner W. E. Kinsley stated today. The recent investigations of labor disputes covered 335 firms employing 6190 workers. Oregon's Wage and Hour law sets standards of employment for women and minors under the age of 18 working in industry.

Most frequent infraction was the failure to keep necessary records of wages and hours which according to the law must be readily available for examination of labor investigators. Nine Klamath Falls employers had neglected to secure work permits for minors on their payrolls. The Bureau of Labor issues such a permit to an employer when the job complies with child labor regulations. Six employers were cited for exceeding the legal maximum work-day of 8 hours or work week of 6 days with 44 hours. Two establishments had rest rooms below minimum standards. Offices led in number of violations and mercantile firms were next.

The Bureau of Labor's report shows women working full-time in the industries checked averaged 40½ hours a week and part-time women workers approximately 23 hours. Ninety-six minor employees had an average 20-hour work week.
