MINSTER, Ohio (AP)—When Ben Martin and his wife brought six youngsters home to live with them in this western Ohio town of 1,300 persons, Martin didn't think it would cause much excitement. Even now that word of the multiple adoption has been in newspapers throughout the country, the 37-year-old tool and dye maker can't understand why people are so interested.

"We didn't have any children of our own and couldn't have any," he explained, "so we adopted them." He referred to Elizabeth, 5; Bernard, 4; Brenda Lou, 2; David, 6; Diana, 9, and John, 8, whom he and his wife adopted last Saturday in Mercer County. The children's mother is dead, he said, but noted the court wouldn't let him say any more about their background.

Farm Weather Program Changed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Weather Bureau said Wednesday it will open a revised and more informative farm weather forecast program on April 1.

On that date, the bureau said, the agricultural weather forecast program for this year's crop growing season will begin over most of the country. It said the program has been redesigned to deliver weather information to farm homes earlier in the day. Main forecasts will be put on the air through local radio stations from 6 to 8 a.m., local time.

The Weather Bureau said it would try to provide more information on weather, drying conditions and the extent of cloudiness or clear skies.

Asylum Issue Settled At Caracas

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—Delegates to the 10th Inter-American Conference pushed ahead with new vigor today after settlement of the bitter dispute between Colombia and Peru over the granting of asylum to Peruvian opposition leader Victor Raul Haya de la Torre.

The case had heavy overtones regarding the whole principle of political asylum, which is of paramount importance to Latin Americans.

Colombian Foreign Minister Evaristo Sordis made the oblique announcement yesterday—without mentioning Haya's name—that his country and Peru had reached a settlement on what to do about the man who has been a political refugee in the Colombian Embassy in Lima since 1948.

Neither Sordis nor Peruvian officials gave any details of the agreement, but authoritative unofficial sources said Haya would be permitted to leave Lima for exile, probably going to Uruguay, which has no common border with Peru.

Man Charged In Panther Hoax

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The man who reported a black panther missing from his animal show has been charged with making a false report.

The black panther scare had hundreds of residents in the Los Angeles area in a dither week before last. The beast supposedly escaped from his cage shortly after Wayne Roberts' show started for Phoenix, Ariz.

"The whole story was a hoax," Police Chief William H. Parker said yesterday. "We were pretty certain of that from the first, but it has taken a lot of checking to substantiate it."

Scores of frightened citizens reported they had seen the black panther. Chief Parker says Roberts concocted the whole story and kept it going so he could get a job as publicity man with a carnival.

Plucky Actress Soon To Wed

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Movie actress Susan Ball, 28, whose right leg was amputated to prevent spread of a malignant growth, will wed actor Dick Long, 26, April 11 in Santa Barbara.

The young couple will be married at El Monteito Presbyterian Church. The actress will walk down the aisle with the aid of crutches.

Man Thrown By Exploding Boiler

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—A termite exterminator was fired through a coal chute like a human cannonball yesterday when a boiler exploded.

Ray Jordan, 41, landed 40 feet away just shy of a concrete driveway, picked himself up and started running. He was hospitalized with burns, but his condition was reported to be good.

Fire Chief R. L. Lamplsey said the blast was believed to have been caused by an antitermite solution coming in contact with a pilot light in the boiler. Flames destroyed the one-story frame residence.

S.F. Kidnap Case Begins

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Defense attorneys are setting a clear pattern of their plan in the Leonard Moskowitz kidnap case—that the whole thing was phoney and the two accused ex-private detectives only carried out their part of a bargain with the victim.

In Tuesday's opening session, defendants Harold Jackson, 32, and Joseph Lear, 42, watched closely as their attorneys questioned seven prospective jurors. They could face a death penalty if convicted.

Jackson contends Moskowitz, a real estate broker, was a willing guest in the house where police found him in an early morning raid Jan. 19. They had captured Lear who spilled the location.

Lear has said he knew nothing of what was planned until Moskowitz was brought into the hide-out and that Jackson forced him to stick after that.

Neither defendant looked at or spoke to the other in court.

The indictment against the two charges violation of California's Little Linderbergh Law—kidnaping with bodily harm—which could mean the death penalty if they are convicted.

No money ever was handed over by Moskowitz' family despite the demands of first \$500,000 and then \$300,000.

Selection of jurors is expected to take several days.

Portland Ship Bids Accepted

PORTLAND (AP)—Several hundred idle men are expected to go back to work in shipyards as a result of low bids on ship repair projects submitted by three Portland firms.

The Northwest Marine Iron Works was awarded a \$209,000 contract for drydocking and overhauling the Navy tanker Mission Purisma.

Albina Engine and Machine Works, Inc., was low bidder for drydocking and overhauling the tanker Mission San Fernando. Albina's bid was \$230,000.

Williamette Iron and Steel, with a bid of \$385,000, was low for decommissioning the Navy transport Gen. M. L. Hersey, which is to be laid up in San Francisco Bay.

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Woman Urges Blood Donors

A former Klamath Falls woman, Mrs. Ruth (Whitney) Black, 1902 Grant Avenue, San Pedro, California, has written the local Red Cross office of her experience as a patient in a hospital some time ago, when she was desperately in need of blood for transfusions.

Her permission to use her experience, was received in a telegram by Virginia Dixon, Red Cross executive.

Mrs. Black said: "Believe me, its value can never be known until a personal experience comes to you. I was taken to a hospital with perhaps a pint of blood left in my body following a serious hemorrhage."

"I can only describe my feelings as being like 'rusty tin.' I could not draw air into my lungs. My heart beats seemed to scratch, and even blinking my eyes was a scratching sensation."

"The Red Cross blood bank was called on. My blood type was scarce and was not available here. But the Red Cross really went to work."
