Norkus, Nardico In Brawl

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (P)—Television fans who like their boxing bloody and brutal should get full satisfaction from tonight's 10-round fight between Charley Norkus and Danny Nardico, a pair of tough sluggers with the dispositions of angry bulls.

They staged an eight-knockdown brawl here Jan. 30. Norkus, an unranked 24-year-old heavyweight from Jersey City, came off the floor twice to win by a technical knockout in the ninth. Nardico was flattened six times.

Tonight's fight at the Miami Beach Auditorium will be televised nationally (CBS) starting at 10 p.m., EST.

ADVANTAGE

Norkus will have a weight advantage of about 15 pounds over Nardico, the 27-year-old Tampa toughie who is ranked seventh among the light heavyweights.

"My guy's a Pier 6 brawler," said Nardico's trainer, Bill Gore. "When he gets hit, he sees red and wants to tear in and kill the other guy. He's got no finesse."

"We've got to hammer at Danny between rounds not to lose his head. If we can hold him down a little, he'll win."

SMARTER

"Norkus is a murderous puncher and a little smarter than Danny," Norkus' manager, Gene Lako, predicted another knockout victory for his fighter and said he believed it would lead to a top 10 rating for him among the heavyweights.

Norkus has won 25 of his 36 fights, 17 by knockouts, but has fought only four 10-rounders. This will be his first appearance on television. Nardico's 63-fight career includes 48 victories, 34 by knockouts.

Evers' Rescue Stint Told

SARASOTA, Fla. (P)—The story of how outfielder Hot Evers helped to rescue a man from drowning in nearby Bradenton two weeks ago was unfolded Wednesday at the Boston Red Sox training camp.

The modest Evers didn't even tell his teammates, but Boston sports writers learned of the rescue.

Pressed for details, the veteran outfielder said he was sitting in his Bradenton home on Palmisola Bay about 10:30 at night when he heard cries for help.

He said he went outside and saw a man struggling in the water about 50 yards from shore. His own boat was tied up. Evers said, so he ran next door to a doctor's home.

The two got the doctor's boat into the water, rowed out and pulled the man aboard.

The Sox outfielder said the man and a friend were fishing and their boat capsized. The man attempted to swim for help but couldn't make it. His friend stayed with the overturned boat and was picked up.

Evers did not give the name of the man or the doctor who aided in the rescue.

Santee Aims for Fabled Mile

Kansan In Try Saturday

CHICAGO (P)—Wes Santee resumes his battle against the stopwatch Saturday night, hoping to stride the fabled 4-minute mile in 11 laps around the board track at Chicago Stadium.

The willowy 21-year-old University of Kansas senior will be making his last record attempt of the indoor track season as he heads a field of five in the Bankers Mile, feature of the 18th annual Chicago Relays.

Gil Dodds set the Bankers Mile record of 4:06.4 in 1944 and no one has come within three seconds of that mark.

Four years later, Dodds posted 4:05.3 at Madison Square Garden, a world record for an 11-lap board track.

Other indoor feats recognized by the AAU as world records are 4:04.4 for a 6 1/2-lap board track, and 4:04.9 on an 8-lap dirt track.

Glenn Cunningham turned 4:04.4 in 1938 at Dartmouth College in a handicap race. Santee was clocked in 4:04.9 in a triangular meet at Michigan State last February.

In outdoor competition, which Santee will start after his Chicago bid, the recognized world record is 4:01.4 by Gunder Haegg at Malmo, Sweden, July 17, 1945. John Landy, the Australian, has posted 4:02 and Santee turned in an American record of 4:02.4 at Compton, Calif., last June.

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Aces Not Enough

Roberts-Simmons Pair Loses to Washington

As many a poker player has learned to his sorrow, the Philadelphia Phillies discovered yesterday that a pair of aces is good, but not always good enough.

In a day of sterling pitching performances throughout the Grapefruit League, the Phils sent Robin Roberts and Curt Simmons against Washington, but the Senators beat the Phillies' aces 3-0. That leaves Manager Steve O'Neill's club with a 5-12 spring record, and it looks as if they'll be in trouble this summer if they can't win with both Roberts and Simmons going for them.

The Senators, who had the fewest total bases of any American League club last year, put on a typical performance by shaming five straight singles against Roberts to tie the game at 2-2 in the fourth inning. Then they drove out three more singles for the winning run in the fifth. Simmons re-

stricted Washington to a scratch single over the last three innings, but Bob Ross of the Senators matched his shutout pitching after relieving Bob Porterfield in the seventh.

Carl Erskine of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who did not pitch in a game until March 13, became the first major league hurler to go the full nine innings as he turned back the Philadelphia Athletics 10-2.

Catcher Roy Campanella led the Dodgers' 14-hit assault on two Philadelphia pitchers with a home run and two singles.

Rookie Tom Brewer, who isn't even on the Boston Red Sox roster but looks like a good prospect to stick, ran his string of scoreless innings to 17 with three good frames in the Sox' 2-0 victory over the Cincinnati Redlegs. Willard Nixon pitched the first six innings for the winners and also drove in the first run with a double.

Larry Jansen and Johnny Antonelli of the New York Giants also teamed up for a shutout, blanking the Chicago Cubs 5-0 in a game cut to 5 1/2 innings because of rain. Each pitcher gave up one hit in three innings.

Vic Raschi, the St. Louis Cardinals' \$75,000 purchase from the New York Yankees, made the deal look better and better as he turned in six scoreless innings in the Cards' 6-5 victory over Milwaukee. Raschi, who gave up three hits in four scoreless innings his first time out as a Cardinal March 10, scattered five Milwaukee singles this time.

The White Sox collected only eight hits to Detroit's 13 but outscored the Tigers 9-7 in the day's only free-hitting contest.

Peeve May Cancel City Playoff Tilt

Eldorado Lumber and National Guard both ended with 13-2 records in City League basketball action that concluded Monday night — but there may not be a game to break the tie.

League officials said the National Guard team was somewhat irked at a recent league ruling that gave back a previously forfeited game to Eldorado, thus putting the Lumbermen in a position to tie the Guards, leaders throughout the season.

A spokesman for the league hinted if the Guards refused to play, the title would be given Eldorado on forfeit.

The game was given back to Eldorado when it was discovered that virtually all the teams in the eight-team league had used ineligible players or carried more than the stipulated 10 players on their rosters sometime during the season.

The spokesman added that the league had also scrapped plans for a playoff involving the top four teams in the league.

Santa Ana Lad Eyes Records

SANTA ANA, Calif. (P)—When you use the term jet-propelled in this town you can mean only one thing—a robust 140 pounds occupied by fleet-footed Bill Swishhelm.

Many Southern California sports-writers believe Bill will become the next "world's fastest human," to carry on the tradition of this area, which has produced more than its share of top sprinters, such as Charley Paddock, Frank Wyckoff and Mel Patton, present world record holder in the 100 and 220.

The 18-year-old high school senior has sprinted the 220-yard dash in 20.8 seconds this year—probably the fastest time anywhere in the nation so far this season. And he has rammed the century in the highly respectable time of 9.7.

His coach, Reece H. (Pinky) Greene of Santa Ana High, thinks the 5-7 youngster has a good chance of cracking the United States high school marks in the 20 (20.7) and 100-yard low hurdles (18.6).

Last Saturday Bill raced over the hurdles in 19.2 and last year negotiated them in 19.1 seconds.
