Eulalona Chapter DAR Named After Indian Village

Klamath County came into existence as a separate political division in 1882. Prior to that period it had been a part of Wasco, Jackson and Lake Counties, respectively, and was known as the "Lake Country" or the "Klamath Country."

This beautiful territory was inhabited by the Klamath and Modoc Indians, who were known to early historians as the La Lakes, or Indians of the Lake Country. These two were warlike tribes and spoke a language peculiar to themselves, and have never been connected through their language with any other North American tribe, unless with the Cayuse, although there seems to be some reason to classify them with the Aztecs of Mexico. They were friendly and intermarried, although they inhabited different parts of the country.

The Klamaths had the region in the vicinity of Big Klamath Lake, to the north of Klamath and west of Link River. At the mouth of Link River they lived in a large Indian village known as Eulalona. This village was peculiar inasmuch as it was built on both banks of the river, and numerous canoes were used in crossing from one side of the village to the other.
