Of our two races of people—it makes you wonder which is the happier? And you mutter half aloud, "Where simplicity was blissful—twas folly to be wishful!"

Our sympathies extend to the fullest measure for publisher Glenn Charles, of the Lake County Examiner and the surviving members of his family whose wife and youngest daughter, met instant death in a head-on collision with another car last Sunday afternoon just this side of Bend. We sincerely hope for a speedy recovery of his eldest daughter, Joan and his son, Bruce who were also injured in the fatal mishap. It is reported Mrs. Charles was a stepdaughter of Bird Wade, now living in New Pine Creek and an only daughter of the late Anna Wade who passed away about a year ago.

Funeral services were held for John Calvin Cloud last Thursday afternoon in the local Baptist Church where Rev. Eugene Barrow officiated to pay honor and respect to a departed loved one and friend.

The deceased was born to William and Emeline Cloud on August 18, 1882 near Chico, Calif. After an illness of several months he passed away in the Modoc Medical Center at Alturas, Calif., March 14, 1954, at the age of 71 years, 6 months and 26 days.

He was reared in a Christian home and at an early age became a Christian. Then he united with the Baptist Church here and remained a kind, trusting man until his death.

He became a blacksmith's apprentice at the age of 16. He followed this trade most of his life. He worked in shops in Lakeview, Alturas, and owned his own shop in New Pine Creek. He also plied his trade in Fort Bragg, Ukiah, Willits and around Clear Lake in Mendocino County California.

In 1892 he went to the state of Washington near Colfax and fol-

lowed his trade there. He also operated his own shop in Sunset, Washington, until the fall of 1900 when he moved to a farm near Spokane. There he farmed until the spring of 1918, at which time he moved to Cheney, Washington, and went to work for the Rod Weeder Company until about 1940. After that he spent most of his time in California until his death.

He was united in marriage to Maggie E. Gully on August 12, 1894. To this union were born four children. His wife preceded him in death in 1927 and also a son, Delbert, in 1951.

He is survived by one brother, Thomas H. Cloud of Willow Ranch, California, one son, Carl W. Cloud, of Ellensburg, Washington; three daughters, Mrs. Bertha Oliver, Redding; Mrs. Ellen Steiner, Cheney; and Mrs. Gladys Porter, New Pine Creek; together with 13 grandchildren, 18 great-grandchildren and many nieces and nephews.

Big Y Market To Expand

An expansion program of the Big Y Market on South Sixth Street, was announced today by the owners, Ronald Phair and Dick Howard. The increase in space was planned to meet anticipated buying demands of the public in the south suburban area, Phair said, in telling of the new addition.

The L-shaped extension, to the rear of the present structure, will provide space for a complete drug department, an extended produce and meat department, more shelf space for groceries and additional storage space. PORTLAND (AP)—Establishment April 1 of a single milk distributor pool in the Klamath Falls area was announced Friday by the State Milk Marketing Administration.

There have been two pools in the area for some time.

The order establishing the single pool resulted from a hearing in Klamath Falls March 19.

Lectures on the Columbia River Basin and the powerhouse at Grand Coulee Dam are conducted every day except Christmas.

More Japanese Victims Of Hydrogen Radiation Found

TOKYO (AP)—Japanese reaction to American hydrogen bomb tests mounted anew today after two more fishing boats returned from the Marshall Islands area showing radiation effects.

The Japanese government officially informed the U.S. that the first boat to be affected, the Fukuryu Maru (Lucky Dragon)—was 40 miles outside the prescribed test danger zone when it was showered with atomic ash March 1.

The two latest fishing boats showing radiation were quarantined. However, they apparently escaped serious harm and no fears for the crew have been expressed by Japanese officials.

One had been operating some 780 miles from the Bikini test site and the other was about 800 miles away.

The Japanese government's note handed U.S. Ambassador John M. Allison reached no "conclusions".

State Highway Opens New Shop

Opening of a new shop at Bend for maintenance of Oregon State Highway equipment was announced here today by Ray Betzer, superintendent of the department.

In the past, all equipment, due for repairs has been brought to the Klamath Falls shop, from distances as far away as Bend to the North and Santax to the East. W. E. Chandler will be division engineer. There will be three resident engineers. Floyd Starkey, Salem will serve as the shop superintendent.

Being transferred from here are Peggy Thompson, bookkeeper, Ed Johnson, and I. E. Iiams, mechanics.

The new shop will open April 1.

It outlined a report on a government investigation. The note said "there is no evidence that the Fukuryu Maru received warnings, by radio message or any other means, while being in the area before the accident occurred."

The new developments came as government officials began to compile the cost of the incident in order to give the U.S. a bill.

The 23 crewmen of the "Lucky Dragon" were reported improving "on the surface." An Air Force plane was sent to Yaku to bring 21 of the men to Tokyo for further medical care. The two most seriously burned crewmen are already in Tokyo hospitals.

The two latest fishing boats to show signs of radiation are the Myojin (Bright God) Maru, which returned to Shiohama north of Tokyo, and the Koei (Radiant Glory) Maru, which returned to Misaki south of Tokyo.

Welfare Ministry officials said the Myojin apparently was only slightly affected. A Geiger counter check showed the radioactivity of the ship was not strong enough to prove harmful to humans.

The Koei Maru received a stronger dose. However, the news agency Kyodo reported that Welfare Ministry officials concluded there was no need for the crew of 25 to receive any medical treatment and the ship could be used after a thorough washing.

Japanese concern over the Bikini tests was demonstrated when another boat returned to Misaki with a bottle of sea water collected near Bikini at the request of officials. The water was tested with a Geiger counter and showed no radioactivity.

Japanese fishery circles were concerned that the latest incidents might further harm the fish market, already suffering as a result of the Fukuryu Maru incident.
