William W. Winningham, 54, former, longtime resident of Klamath Falls, died March 26 at Forest Creek near Jacksonville. Funeral services will be held from the Conger-Morris Funeral Home, Medford, Monday, March 29 at 2:30 p.m. The Rev. Raymond E. Balcomb of the First Methodist Church will officiate assisted by the Medford Masonic Lodge. Final rites and interment in Log-town Cemetery.

Mr. Winningham was born near Jacksonville, June 17, 1899, the son of Mark and Nancy Winningham, Oregon pioneers. He was married May 20, 1920 to Gertrude Butler, who survives him.

Oregon Barley To Increase

Reports from the State Market- ing Office indicates that barley and oats will increase considerably this year. Wheat acreage is due to be cut and Marion D. Thomas, extension economist at Oregon State College says this cut will be about 28 per cent. This is mainly acreage taken out of wheat under marketing quotas and planted to other grains. He estimates that barley acreage in Oregon will be up 79 per cent and oat acreage up 33 per cent.

This follows the national pattern of changing acreage from basic commodity crops under marketing quotas, and planting to other grains and general field crops.

Copies of the farm outlook will cover this situation in more detail and will soon be available, according to county agent, C. A. Henderson.
