



### Church To Hear Guest Speaker

The Rev. Everett Howard, formerly a missionary in the Cape Verde Islands, will be guest speaker at the Church of the Nazarene Thursday, April 1, at 7:30 p.m.

The returned missionary, now of San Antonio, Texas, has served as superintendent of the Texas-Mexican District of the Church of the Nazarene since 1952. He heads the Spanish-speaking churches of this area, which comprises parts of Texas and Mexico.

Prior to his superintending position, the Rev. Howard was a missionary for his denomination in the Cape Verde Islands for 18 years. From a small beginning in 1936, he saw the mission work develop until a strong and effective native Nazarene church was established on six of the islands in the Cape Verde Group.

Mrs. Howard accompanied her husband in his missionary work and made an important contribution to the success of the church's ministry, especially among the women of Cape Verde.

Because of Mrs. Howard's ill health, the family, including two daughters, returned to the United States in 1951.

The Howards' visit in Klamath Falls will be one stop on a tour of the Oregon-Pacific District. Also

### Oregon Uranium Strike Fizzles

HARPER, Ore. (AP) — No worthwhile uranium ore samples have yet been found in this area of Eastern Oregon, the State Department of Geology reported Monday.

Some 40 claims have been staked out in the last two weeks because two Ontario men reported they found uranium-bearing rock near here.

F. W. Libbey, state geology director, said that tests so far show there is not enough uranium in the rock to be of commercial value.


