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Radio Station Sale Announced

SALEM (AP) — The name of W. Gordon Allen of Salem figured in reports of sales of two radio stations Tuesday.

Orlo Bagley, Cottage Grove lumberman, reported he had purchased station KSGA at Cottage Grove, Ore., from the Coast Fork Broadcasting Co., with which Allen is affiliated. The sale price was not disclosed.

At Washington, the Santa Clara Broadcasting Co. of San Jose, Calif., applied to the Communications Commission for permission to transfer control of KXSJ from Patrick Peabody to Allen and Lewis E. Pett of Los Angeles. That transaction, subject to FCC approval, was reported several days ago.

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Water Supply Said Good

BEND (AP) — Water prospects for Central Oregon for the coming irrigation year are generally good, a water forecast meeting was told here Tuesday.

The Deschutes River Basin will have slightly higher than average stream flow. The Crooked River Basin, however is a somewhat less fortunate condition. A flow of only 31 per cent of the 10-year average is predicted at Post.

The Ochoco Reservoir will get only 46 per cent of the average amount of water in the next six months, but the area will have enough water for its summer's needs since the reservoir already is full and overflowing.

A flow of 312,000 acre feet, 110 per cent of the 10-year average is expected in the Deschutes at Pringle Falls. At Denham Falls the forecast is for 106 per cent of average. The Little Deschutes near Lapine has a forecast flow of 106 per cent during the next six months.

Both Wickiup and Crane Prairie reservoirs are full.

W. T. Frost of the Soil Conservation Service and Dave Bauman of the Portland Weather Bureau's river forecast center, made the forecasts.

Solon Urges Action In Asian War

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) asserted today the United States ought to "get ready for the worst" by enlisting forces of Pacific free nations to fight Communists in Indochina if they are needed.

Douglas, a Marine officer in World War II, called for support of President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles in seeking what Dulles called "united action" to prevent Communist conquest in Southeast Asia.

"I do not know what measures this administration plans," Douglas said in a speech prepared for the Senate. "I do not know what measures will prove to be necessary."

"I do not know what attitude the Republican party in Congress will take toward supporting the President. But reading the record against the gravity of the secretary's words, I have my misgivings."

Douglas said in a nationally televised speech Monday night that Communist control of Southeast Asia would be "a great threat" to the free world and that:

"The United States feels that that possibility should not be passively accepted but should be met by united action."

Traffic Deaths At Lower Level

CHICAGO (AP)—The nation's traffic deaths in February dropped to 2,470, the lowest level in three years, the National Safety Council reported today.

The figure was 2 per cent lower than the total for February 1953. In February 1951 there were 2,550 deaths.

Traffic deaths in the first two months of this year numbered 5,370, a decline of 1 per cent from the toll in the corresponding period of last year.
