New York Bowler Rolls Perfect Game

SEATTLE (AP) — Tony Sparando of Rego Park, N.Y., has been looking for a 300 game in American Bowling Congress competition for 11 years and brother, he's happy. He found it here Wednesday.

The 48-year-old owner of a bowling center became the 13th man in 51 years of ABC championships to roll a perfect game. He did it on his first appearance in singles competition and it looked as if he were the coolest man in the crowded house while he was knocking the pins down—10 at a time—with thrilling regularity.

His first shot went high on the head pin but they all tumbled.

Smith To Test Jim Byrne

Saturday night's boxing card will give the local boxing fans another look at Jimmy Byrne as he meets tough Roger Smith in a scheduled ten round battle.

The Byrne-Smith battle is the topper of a program that will have possibly 30 rounds of boxing.

"Big Jim" made a very brief appearance in the Army ring on March 6 against Al Winn of Vallejo, California. Byrne out-weighted Winn by twenty five pounds and completely outclassed the smaller man in posting a second round knockout.

This week's battle will be a little different story as far as weight is concerned and will prove to be a good test for Byrne. Smith, a San Francisco heavyweight, will weigh somewhere around the 205 pound mark when the two meet. Byrne weighs in about ten pounds heavier.

In the semi-windup Beatty's Ralph Weiser will meet Smith's stable mate from Frisco, Al Moore, a scrappy Negro 139 pounder.

The Weiser-Moore bout is scheduled to go a distance of six rounds. George Bray will tangle with Vince Tero, another Californian in a special 6 round event. This will be Bray's first six round outing as he is usually paired in a four rounder.

Bob Barney and Dick Henry will fight it out in one of possible two four round matches. Barney is from Sprague River and Henry is another Beatty fighter. Henry, by the way, is Weiser's sparring partner when the two are preparing for a fight.

Matchmaker Mack Lillard is looking for a good boxer to meet Duane McDaniel of Ohioquin, in another four round opener.

Dick Reeder is handling the advance ticket sales of Saturday's big ring program, according to Lillard.

Even the most ardent rooter for the Philadelphia Phillies will concede that without an effective Robert Roberts, the club hasn't a ghost of a chance of winning the National League pennant. And Mr. Roberts' showing this spring can hardly be described as "effective."

Just what, if anything, is bothering the strapping right-hander hasn't been determined. Maybe it's the heavy work (347 innings) he put in last season. Or could he be just pacing himself. At any rate, Roberts is a far cry from the fireballing pitcher who won 107 games in his last five National League seasons.

FIRST TIME
Yesterday, the 6-foot-1½ native of Springfield, Ill., went the route for the first time this spring, but he was raked for 13 hits as the

Phillies dropped a 7-2 decision to the Detroit Tigers.
The time before that (March 27), he was shelled from the mound in the fourth inning after he had yielded seven runs to the Chicago White Sox. His over-all exhibition record is 0-3, which could augur a disappointing campaign for the 23-game winner of 1953.

The Phillies are said to have strengthened their pitching staff with the acquisition of Murry Dickson and Johnny Lindell from Pittsburgh. Curt Simmons and Jim Konstanty have looked good in recent outings, but if Manager Steve O'Neill can't count on Roberts for at least 20 victories, the Phillies likely would settle for fourth place right now.

BIG GUN
First baseman Charley Kress was the big gun in the Detroit attack yesterday, blasting one of

in the fourth inning.
Gerry Staley, another of the National League's star right-handers, fared better than Roberts yesterday. He gave up only two hits in seven innings as the St. Louis Cardinals downed the Chicago bullpen ace, preserved the Cards' third straight triumph and their 14th in 22 games by choking off a ninth-inning rally.

The New York Giants, who look more formidable every day, scored their ninth victory in 12 starts against the Cleveland Indians, 4-2. The Tribe committed four errors.

The Giants collected only four hits, but Willie Mays doubled home the first run and Don Mueller singled in two more, all in the opening frame.

SURPRISING
Ending their worst Florida showing in the six years under Casey Stengel's regime, the New York Yankees dropped a 9-3 decision to the surprising Pittsburgh Pirates. The loss was the 16th in 24 games for the world champions. The Pirates put the game out of reach in the first inning when they scored

five times against lefty Bob Wiesler.
Gil Hodges' homer sparked a 13-hit Brooklyn attack as the Dodgers whipped the Milwaukee Braves 10-7. The game was called at the end of the eighth to permit the clubs to make a train. Eddie Mathews and Johnny Logan each homered twice for the Braves.

The improving Washington Senators broke loose for five runs in cinnati Redlegs 9-2. Tom Wright, Sox, homered during the big inning.

Bevo Gets Scoring Records From NCAA

NEW YORK (AP) — The NCAA Service Bureau Thursday gave Bevo Francis a flock of new basketball scoring records to replace the ones the nation's coaches wouldn't let him keep last year.

Francis, the 6-9 one man gang from Rio Grande College in Ohio, won the individual scoring championship among small college players and topped the list in 10 other single game, season and career records compiled by the NCAA statisticians.

Francis did just as well last year. But the National Basketball Coaches Assn. voted to recognize only the points scored against four year colleges. This knocked out almost two-thirds of Bevo's 1952-53 games.

AVERAGE
This season Francis scored 1,255 points in 27 games against four year schools, an average of 46.5 per game. The best previous performance was 970 points by Johnny O'Brien of Seattle in 1952 and an average of 38.9 by Roger Kuss of River Falls (Wis.) State last year.

Francis also became the first player to score more than half of his team's points in a season.

BETTERED
Bob Hopkins of Grambling (La.) College also bettered O'Brien's single season point total with 1,002 points.

Montclair State of New Jersey averaged 96.7 points a game, a record, and broke 100 in 11 games, also a new high.

Sophomore R. C. Owens of the College of Idaho surpassed the existing record on rebounds with an average of 27.1. The old mark was 25.5, equalled this season by Maurice Stokes of St. Francis of Pennsylvania.

Whitworth College of Spokane, Wash., had the best team defense, the Pirates holding their opponents to an average of 56.4 points in 25 games. Idaho State was fifth best—57.6 in 27 contests.
