Wendell Corey Returns To Comedy Roles In New Play

 HOLLYWOOD — Seven years ago, Wendell Corey was brought to Hollywood on the strength of his work in the stage comedy "Dream of a Girl." Today he's doing another comedy, but he had to go back to the stage for it.

In the garishly Biltmore Theater of downtown Los Angeles, I watched Corey, Diana Lynn, Eselle Winwood, Marshall Thompson and others rehearse "Sabrine Fair" prior to its Phoenix opening. On a nearly bare stage, the players went through their lines in the New York bit, which will play Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle in its road tour.

After the run-through, Corey went to lunch. He seemed happy to be returning to comedy, which had been his strong suit on the stage. Yet with one exception, he has done no comedies in the couple of dozen films he has done here. And that exception didn't draw many laughs and had best be forgotten.

"I came to Hollywood at a time

when everything was grim," explained Corey. "I don't mean the business; the movie industry was still prospering then. But producers were making hard tales of crime and corruption, and I fitted into the pattern."

"I was either the criminal or the lawyer. Prosecution or defense, it didn't quite jell. It got so that I almost felt I had passed the bar."

When he first arrived in Hollywood, he was hustled right to Arizona to do a hard Western tale with Burt Lancaster and John Hodiak, "Desert Fury." He has been hustling from picture to picture ever since, with stage work, TV and radio sandwiched between.

On one occasion, he was rushed to MGM to play opposite Lana Turner in "A Life of Her Own." He escaped from the studio just as fast.

"I worked one day only," he recalled. "I didn't care for the script, and Miss Turner and I

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Senate Ends State Debate

WASHINGTON — The Senate winds up a month of on-and-off debate on Hawaii-Alaska statehood today with prospects that the vote, indicated by nightfall, would send the measure on to the House.

The measure lacks administration endorsement in its present tandem form and faces an uncertain future in the House, which last year passed a bill to grant statehood to Hawaii only. That is all President Eisenhower has asked.

Sen. Smathers (D-Fla.), a leading opponent of statehood for both territories, conceded that Senate passage of the bill is "fairly certain."

"In the face of a tremendous and skillful campaign of pressure and propaganda, it is gratifying to believe that the vote will be fairly close," he said in a statement.

In the House, Republican leaders reportedly are set against Alaska statehood now and determined to prevent it from coming to a vote—either alone or combined with Hawaii.

Sen. Anderson (D-NM), primary sponsor of the successful move in the Senate to tie Hawaii and Alaska together in the Senate, said Senate passage of the combined bill would put the issue squarely up to Eisenhower.

He said presidential endorsement of Alaska statehood could change the situation in the House overnight and clear the way for two new stars in the American flag. Eisenhower told a news conference in February he does not believe Alaska is ready for statehood.
