Molotov Gives Soviet Note

MOSCOW (AP)—Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov called in the ambassadors of the United States, Britain and France Wednesday and handed them a Soviet note containing proposals for European security.

Contents of the note were not disclosed by the ambassadors, who cabled the text to their respective capitals.

Western embassy officials said the Soviet note was 10 pages long. The Molotov proposals apparently were intended as an advance

statement for the Geneva conference of the Big Four with Red China and other powers opening April 26.

At the recent Berlin Big Four conference Molotov proposed a European security plan which rejected the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and the proposed European Defense Community.

Molotov asserted that these Western plans divided Europe and set one section of Europe against another, thus threatening peace.

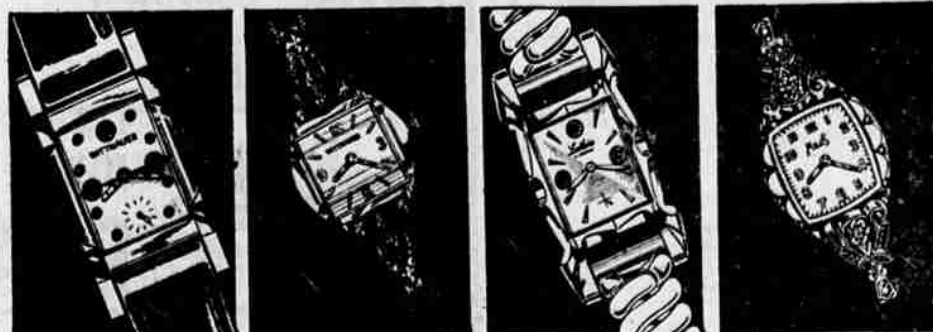
