Beauty Treatment Cause of Death

LOS ANGELES (AP)—An autopsy surgeon has testified that a young waitress died because she absorbed carbolic acid through the skin during a complexion treatment. The acid caused a respiratory paralysis, Dr. Frederick Newbarr told a jury yesterday at the manslaughter trial of Mrs. Mary Penny 59. The victim was Mrs. Kay Stanley, 32. Newbarr said Mrs. Stanley's lungs and heart were good. The prosecutor told the jury Mrs. Penny operated without a state license and used a carbolic acid solution that was too strong for a face peel.
