

Byrne Registers TKO Over Smith

Jimmy Byrne made another brief appearance before Klamath boxing fans last Saturday night when he posted a two round TKO over highly regarded Roger Smith of San Francisco.

Byrne, who has tried to make a hit with the local ring followers in both his appearances at the Armory, landed a hard overhand right that imbedded a deep cut over Smith's left eye and referee Wally Moss stopped the fight.

The big Portland heavyweight opened the scheduled ten rounder, by giving Smith a bloody nose in the first round with continuous left jabs and hooks to the face. After one minute and 30 seconds of the second frame, Byrne landed his overhand blow that made Moss decide against further injury to the Californian.

QUICK ENDING
The fans, who packed into the Armory to see what they expected to be a longer showing than Byrne's last appearance against Al Winn, were not the only ones who were disappointed about the quick ending. Byrne stated after the fight that he thought that Smith was a "tough fighter" and would like to have had the bout last longer than it did.

It was Jarrin Jim's twentieth win in twenty-five starts. Fourteen of the wins were by knockouts.

The semi-windup affair between Al Moore, also of San Francisco, and Ralph Welsler, the Beatty Bomber, stole the show from the last lasting main event.

Welsler and the Armory fans found out that they had a ring clown to put up with. This was hard for Welsler, but the fans were kept laughing at Moore's unorthodox style of fighting, and ring antics.

The Beatty battler, who was outwitted by the tall Frisco Negro, fought on even terms with the clown and gained a six round split with the Bay Area fighter. Two of the officials gave a split verdict and one leaned towards Moore.

In another six rounder that ended in a draw, George Bray, of Bonanza, made a hit with the local ring enthusiasts by holding Vince Terro, the third Bay Area fighter on the card, to a draw in the eyes of all three officials.

Bray was making his first six round start and is sure to be back on Promoter Mack Lillard's future boxing cards.

In the third four rounder that was served up on the ring menu, Bob Barney, of Sprague River, turned in a third round knockout over Beatty's Dick Henry in one minute and 40 seconds.

Duane McDaniels completely outclassed Harry Hood of Chiloquin, and scored a first round TKO over the Chiloquin Indian. McDaniels

Records Broken At Relays

SALEM (AP) — Five track and field records were established Saturday as an estimated 2,000 students from 69 high schools competed in the fourth annual Willamette Relays.

Gerald Kinnaman, of Centralia, Wash., the individual star of the meet, posted one of the meet records with a 133-foot discus toss.

Gerald Fells, of Vancouver, Wash., threw the discus 151 feet, 6 3/4 inches for the senior record.

Don Marshall of St. Helens set a senior shotput record—51 feet, 6 1/2 inches.

ESTABLISH
Salem and Vancouver teams tied at 40.1 seconds to establish a 440-yard relay mark, and Salem set another record in the two-mile relay with a time of 8 minutes, 44.5 seconds.

Kinnaman led the field with three individual victories—the novice high jump, the discus and a 120-yard hurdle heat. Duane Keraan of Vancouver, Wash., posted two individual victories—the senior high jump and broad jump.

No official team totals were kept. However, under a 5-3-1 point system for the first three places in each event, Salem led the field with 86 points.

Even two days ago, he probably wasn't quite sure. But today he cast his lot with the Boston Red Sox and with only one year of professional experience behind him, he is in line to be at least the part-time first baseman for the Boudreau's outfit.

The Chicago Cubs thumped the Baltimore Orioles 10-2 with a seven run outburst in the seventh. The Cincinnati Redlegs downed the Washington Senators 10-4 with Wally Post, who couldn't make the team last year, leading the assault with a three-run homer, two doubles and a single.

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Olson's Battle With Kid Settles Many Questions

NEW YORK (AP)—After a week-end of quiet meditation, the only conclusion we've been able to come to is that Bobo Olson, the current 160-pound boxing champion, is a whole lot of middleweight and that it will be a long time before they ask another welterweight to try to whip him.

The man from Honolulu would have been a hard one to take in any period of boxing's history, including the bare-knuckle days, in which he would have been revealed. There undoubtedly have been periods in which he would not have held the title, but not one in which he would not have been a highly respected contender.

GRIEVOUS
It was a grievous mistake to have picked Kid Gavilan to beat him, especially since the odds in Olson's favor never wavered from the day the match was made. It was a case of seeing the Cuban in the mind's eye slicing up men of his own weight and not quite appreciating what he was running into in Olson.

There still is a feeling of disappointment that Gavilan did not until the final round open up with the brilliant two-fisted flurries for which he has been noted. It would at least have made for a more exciting fight. But there also is a sneaking feeling that he might have been stopped if he had chosen sooner to exchange with the tattooed boy.

RALLY
It was not, as a matter of fact, until Gavilan put on his final desperate rally that the crowd in the Chicago Stadium and the great television audience had a chance

to see Olson at his best. One felt that was what the more rugged champion had been waiting for all along. Faced with everything the Cuban could throw, he refused to cover up or accept a clinch and instead stood squarely and threw in those murderous short blows that must have felt like rocks to Gavilan.

That must be the explanation of why Gavilan and his advisers chose to try to steal the title with a left hand alone. They had a strong suspicion what would happen if the Hawk attempted to arch his customary rights to Olson's head. His body, including those jolly extra pounds about his middle would never have survived 15 rounds of the punishment it would have been asked to absorb.
