Bragan Continues Umpire Baiting

LOS ANGELES (AP) — With the Pacific Coast League campaign-ship set to open Tuesday, Bobby Bragan, the fiery manager of the Hollywood Stars, has started his umpire-baiting Hi-jinks with a lie down strike.

In his first year at the helm in 1953, unpredictable Bobby did a great job of piloting the Stars to a second straight PCL pennant, but collected seven fines and a five-day suspension en route.

Sunday Bragan pulled something new as the Stars took a 6-4 exhibition game decision over Los Angeles.

RULING
Vexed with a ruling by Umpire Emmett Ashford in the ninth inning, Bragan first ranted and raved. For this he received the heave-ho order. But Bobby didn't leave. He reclined on the diamond.

Finally tiring of the turf, he got up and stalked off. The crowd at Long Beach mingled boos with cheers as Bragan indicated he's ready for the season.

Lineups appear set for Tuesday's opener — Portland at Hollywood. Los Angeles at San Diego, Seattle at San Francisco and Oakland at Sacramento — with veterans handling most of the chores.

San Francisco nominated Tony Fonce as the opening day hurler and hopes he'll show the form that won eight games without a loss after being called up from the Class A California League late last season. Fonce, who has been shelled during spring exhibition contests, opposes Al Widmar, a 20-game winner for Seattle.

Emil Patrick, drafted from Birmingham, gets the hurling assignment for Sacramento, with Al Gettel hurling for Oakland. At Hollywood, Al Queen opposes either Glenn Elliott or Red Adams of Portland.

Manager Charley Dressen returns to Oakland this season after his fallout with the Brooklyn management last fall.

Seattle has a new manager in Gerry Friday and Bill Sweeney takes over the Los Angeles reins. Sweeney, deposited at Seattle after last season, succeeded Stan Hack at Los Angeles when Stan was called to manage the Chicago Cubs.

Konno Adds Three Titles After Meet

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Ford Konno, probably the world's outstanding middle-distance swimmer today, claims there is no secret to his success — "I just like to swim."

The 21-year-old Hawaiian powerhouse has been swimming for 12 years in big league competition and apparently his formula is okay, judging by the Olympic and other titles he has captured.

Konno added the National AAU indoor 1500-meter, 220 and 400 yard freestyle crowns to his collection during the three-day meet which ended in Yale's pool Saturday night. With it went the title of the meet's outstanding swimmer, a medal and almost certain choice for this country's team in the Pan-American games to be held next March in Mexico.

Konno and two teammates — Yoshi Oyakawa, ace backstroke, and Dick Cleveland, star sprinter — captured six of the meet's 11 individual titles. Konno took three, Oyakawa two (100 and 150-yard backstroke), and Cleveland (100-yard freestyle) against the toughest competition in the long history of the event.

Economy Run Gets Underway
LOS ANGELES (AP) — Twenty new passenger automobiles left Los Angeles at two-minute intervals starting at 12:01 a.m. Monday on the 1,335-mile Mobilgas economy run to Sun Valley, Idaho.

The annual trip is sponsored by the company to test miles-per-gallon ratings of cars ranging in price from \$1,500 to \$5,000. Each car is fueled under inspection conditions. A driver, relief driver and two members of the American Automobile Assn., go in each car.

Monday's run is 554 miles to San Francisco via Bakersfield, Fresno, Yosemite Park and Merced with a time limit of 13 hours. A 25-minute stop for refueling and a 15-minute stop for inspection are included. The competing automobiles will be impounded Monday night in San Francisco and Tuesday night in Elko, Nev.

Lakers Lead Pro Playoffs
SYRACUSE, N. Y. (AP) — The Minneapolis Lakers today held a 2-1 edge over injury-riddled Syracuse in their quest for a fifth National Basketball Assn. championship in six years thanks to the chips-down playing of the old maestro, George Mikan.

It was Mikan's 30 points and his command of the backboards last night that paced the Lakers to an 81-67 victory over the Nationals in the world series of pro basketball.

Garden's Gate Doesn't Open Too Easily

NEW YORK — (NEA) — "Why is it," Emil Sardinelli wanted to know, "that some people, even if they have enough money to buy the building, will do anything to get into a sports event without paying?"

Sardinelli is the man in charge of the gate at Madison Square Garden and the job, at this point, was beginning to get on his nerves. He sat in his office at one end of the big lobby and watched, through the open door, as the crowds shuffled into the world's best-known indoor sports arena.

"It's the crashers," he said — and then automatically began to shake his head in the "No" sign all guys in his trade acquire after a short time. It was a tough night for Emil and his staff. They had a sellout for a college basketball tournament and the gate crashers were out in force.

"Take the guy I just had to go to the main entrance and handle," he said.

PRODUCE
The guy got into the joint with a blue ticket. The side arena tickets are colored that way to light. Well, the blue ticket this guy had happened to be for a fight last year some time. The ticket taker didn't have time to look at it closely enough and the guy slipped it over on him. But the floor man inside noticed the stub and when the guy couldn't produce anything he made him leave. He put up a fuss and they called for me.

"You know what the guy told me?" He said, "I beat you guys fair and square. I busted into the joint. Now why don't you be a good loser and leave me alone." The guy thinks it's a game or something."

Sports crowds, as a rule, are pretty free with a dollar. Of the millions that Sardinelli has seen enter the Garden during his years at the big New York arena, he remembers few faces. Most of the time, the fans just fly in and

after them now. How crazy can you get?"

Normally, an usher's job looks like a quiet one. Take people to their seats and that's it. But promoters long have recognized the value in a good staff of ushers. They can make or break your show by their handling of the crowd. The Garden has always kept the reputation for having the best sports ushers in the business.

"But it isn't easy to keep it that way," Sardinelli says. "If it isn't the crashers, it's the other guys — the ones who get in a jam at home because they're here. Take the night I had to see this woman at the front door. She was well-dressed and seemed to be giving me the right dope. She said her husband — this was on a hockey

"If you think he's kidding, come on outside and I'll show you," Eddie Miller, one of the chief ushers, said.

Braves Second Choice

NEW YORK (AP) — The Brooklyn Dodgers' chief aim is to defeat the New York Yankees in a World Series. With that as an added incentive, the Dodgers should overcome such possible handicaps as old age and a new manager and march to their third consecutive National League pennant.

Actually, the Brooks have just about everything a winning baseball team needs. Their tremendous power, airtight defense, good speed and a strong bench together with the best pitching they've had since 1941 should best down the challenges of the Milwaukee Braves, St. Louis Cardinals and other hopefuls.

FLATTENED
The Dodgers have won five pennants in the last 13 years but on each occasion were flattened in the World Series by the Yankees. Some say the reason Charlie Dressen had the rug yanked out from under him was because of his failure to beat the Yankees.

This would point the finger directly at Walter Alston, Dressen's successor. Al Alston has to do to prove his worth is win the World Series.

The Brooks will open the season with the same club that won 103 games in 1953, clinched the flag at the earliest date in National League history (Sept. 12), hit 208 home runs and set 40 major league, National League and club records — with one exception. It will have Don Newcombe, the big Negro righthander who won 20 games in 1951 before called up for a two-year hitch in the Army.

The reinforced Braves, who finished a surprising second, 13 games behind the Dodgers last year, could conceivably dethrone the Dodgers but it appears doubtful. The Brooks are just plain loaded with such top flight stars as Jackie Robinson, Roy Campanella, Duke Solder, Carl Furillo, Peeewe Reese, Gil Hodges, Billy Cox and Junior Gilliam.

OLDSTERS
The Dodgers do have a defect. It is an old club. This could be the Achilles' heel. Gilliam is 25 and Snider 27. All the other regulars are over 30. It is well to remember, though, that these oldsters have been able to keep an exceptional group of younger players like Don Zimmer, Don Koss and Sandy Amoros from breaking into the lineup.

1. Brooklyn, 2. Milwaukee, 3. St. Louis, 4. New York, 5. Philadelphia, 6. Cincinnati, 7. Pittsburgh, 8. Chicago.

Were it not for the Dodgers, the Braves would be a good bet for the pennant. They have a sound team that packs sufficient punch, a sound defense and their pitching is the envy of the league. They received a tremendous blow, however, when Bobby Thomson, their cleanup hitter acquired from the Giants, suffered a triple ankle fracture in an exhibition game. It may be late June before the slug-ging leftfielder is back in the lineup.

Fletcher Saul Rogovin of the Cincinnati Redlegs was a third baseman in the minor leagues.
