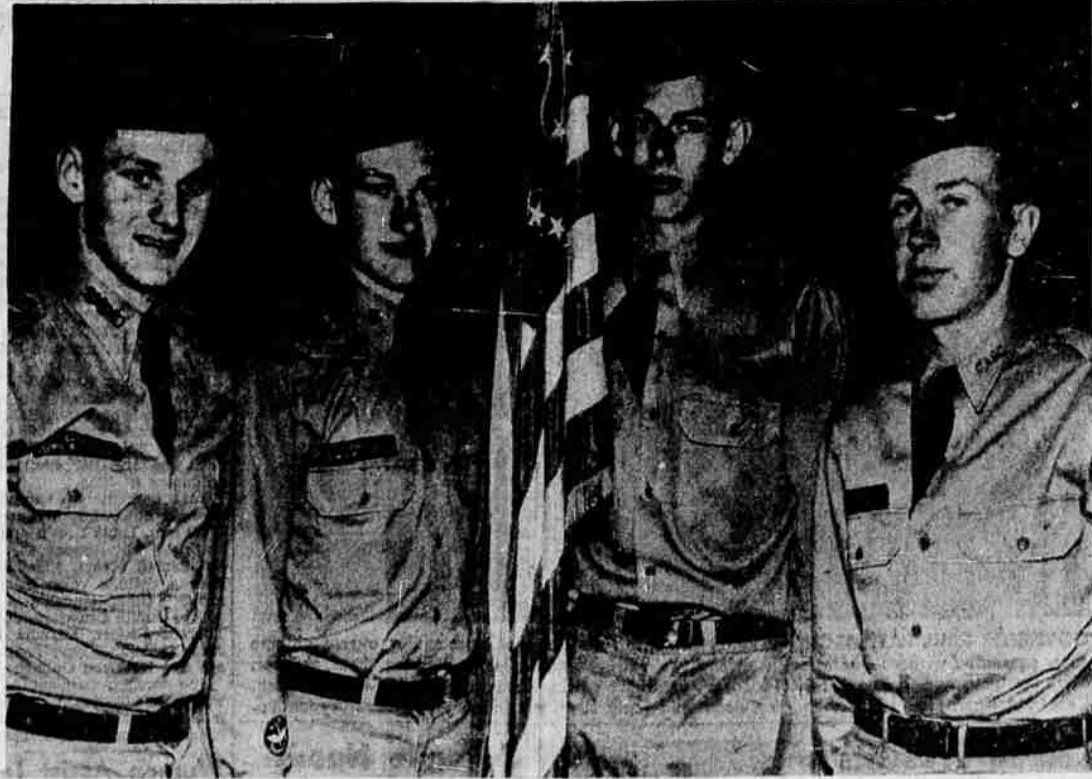
The Finance committee, on which the Oklahoman serves, opens hearings today on a big tax revision bill to which Democrats hope to attach the income tax reduction.

Mrs. Slough Dies At 91

One of Klamath Falls early day teachers, Mrs. Myra V. Slough, resident here since 1903, died this morning at Hillside Hospital from the infirmities of age. She was 91 years old.

With her husband, the late W. S. Slough, she came from Washington near the Canadian line. Mr. Slough became superintendent of the grade school and Mrs. Slough taught the first and second grades in the old school building on 10th street, moved several years ago to make way for a parking lot.

Mr. Slough was succeeded as superintendent in 1905 by R. H. Dunbar, Klamath Falls, later went into the real estate and abstracting business and Mrs. Slough retired from the school room.

Mr. Slough died 25 years ago. Mrs. Slough lived for many years at the family home, 131 Washington Street where she fell and broke a hip some time ago. Later she lived for a time in the White Pine Apartments, but advancing age brought her retirement to Hillside Hospital for care, February 28 of this year.

She was a member of the First Presbyterian Church, taught an adult class for women in the Sunday School for many years, and with her husband sang in the church choir.

She has no close relatives in the west. An invalid brother lives in Ohio and she has several nieces and nephews.

Among intimate friends are Mr. and Mrs. Bert C. Thomas, Mr. and Mrs. Burge Mason Sr., Mr. and Mrs. Earl Redmond, Dr. and Mrs. George Wright, Mrs. Marion Hanks, Mrs. Ida Grimes and Marjorie Smith, all of Klamath Falls.
