Grains CHICAGO GRAIN CHICAGO (U)—Grains, soybeans and lard all extended into higher price territory Thursday, although some backed away from their highs for the day toward the close. Wheat moved ahead promptly and stayed there in anticipation of Friday's government crop report on indicated production and abandonment. Soybeans also made a strong showing while lard set new seasonal highs on May and July deliveries. May was at its highest since September late in the season. Wheat finished 2 1/2-2 3/4 cents higher, May 2.18 1/2, corn was 1 to 1 1/2 up, May 1.40 1/2-1 1/4; oats were 1 1/2 higher, May 75 1/2-76; and rye was 1 1/2-2 1/4 higher, May 1.07 1/2; soybeans were 1 1/2 to 2 cents higher, May 2.65 1/2-3.66, and lard was 5 to 43 cents a hundred pounds better, May 20.13.

Cold Canada Air Moves Into U.S. By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Cold Canadian air surging southward put a chill on the balmy spring weather in most of the Midwest Thursday. The mass of cold air covered the north central section and extended southward into Texas. It continued to move south and eastward. The leading edge of the cold front extended from Northeast Ohio southwestward along the Ohio River and into Eastern Texas. Temperatures generally were below freezing in the Northern Plains and Northern Great Lakes region and extended southward into parts of Nebraska, Iowa and Wisconsin. Snow flurries fell in the Northern Great Lakes.

Highway Crash Victim Dies ASTORIA (U)—Kenneth Peterson, 18, died here Wednesday night, third victim of a head-on highway crash Monday night at Warrenton. One of the cars contained five youths who were being chased at the time by Warrenton police for "squirreling"—erratic driving. Two of the victims—Peterson and Ray Koski, 17, who died Tuesday—were in that car. The driver of the other, Mrs. Margaret Cutler, was killed outright. District Atty. Thomas E. Brownhill Wednesday had a complaint drawn up charging Wayne R. Fournier, 19, Astoria, with negligent homicide. Fournier was driver of the car containing the youths, he said. Fournier has been improving and was thought Thursday to be out of danger. The remaining two passengers, though, still were in critical condition. They are Dale Larson, 20, and Kenneth Dyke, 17.

Court Upholds Conviction WASHINGTON (U)—The U.S. Court of Appeals Thursday affirmed the perjury conviction of E. Merl Young, a key figure in the Senate's headline-making investigation of Reconstruction Finance Corp. operations. At the same time the court overturned the perjury conviction of Young's older brother, Herschel Young. The brothers, tried separately, each received a sentence of four months to two years. Both have been at liberty on bond pending the outcome of their appeals. Merl Young, 38, was convicted of swearing falsely four times before the Senate investigating subcommittee and the federal grand jury which returned the indictments. The appeals court, however, dealt only with one charge—involving Young's denial that while employed by the RFC he ever had anything to do with loan applications made by the Lustron Corp., an ill-fated prefabricated housing venture. It held his conviction on that count to be "clearly valid."

Car Ends In Tree After Accident NORTH REDDING, Mass. (U)—This is what happened after farmer Kenneth G. Ormsby, 39, lost control of his car last night: The car overturned four times and bounced off the highway and up into a tree. The front axle caught on a branch 12 feet from the ground. Ormsby climbed down and police took him to a hospital. Doctors treated him for cuts on his arms and legs and sent him home.

Youth Placed On Probation

An 18-year-old high school student who was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail and fined a total of \$250 for two offenses, had the penalties modified Thursday by District Judge D. E. Van Vactor. The defendant, Ronald Dale Larson, who spent 36 hours in jail, was arrested by state police on charges of reckless driving and possession of intoxicating liquor. When he appeared in court Wednesday afternoon, Judge Van Vactor sentenced him to 10 days in jail and assessed a fine of \$100 on the reckless driving charge. On the liquor count the student was given a 20-day jail sentence and fined \$150.

Probationers Jobs Sought It's a rocky road back to economic stability for persons on probation in Oregon. This was the declaration Thursday of State Probation Officer Otto Paulsen when he made an appeal to employers to give probationers a chance to work. "Before a man is placed on probation," Paulsen explained, "his case is given most careful consideration. If the court is not thoroughly convinced the subject wants to make good probation will not be granted." According to records in the probation office here, 25 men are now seeking jobs. Paulsen said many probationers are applying for permission to leave the state because they can't get work. "The probationer is faced with two choices," he added. "When he applies for a job, he can either conceal the fact that he is on probation or come clean with the prospective employer. In the first instance, he may get the job and be fired later. The other possibility is if he reveals his true status he may not get the job at all." Paulsen also said that many persons in the Klamath Basin have shown a willingness to give work to probationers. "We wish to thank these persons," he continued. "We ask anyone who is willing to give a probationer a job to contact our office, Willits Building."

Barley Support Price Announced The Klamath county support for the 1954 barley crop, just received at the county agents office is at the rate of \$1.17 per bushel. Calculated on the hundredweight basis this would be about \$2.43 per cwt. County Agent C. A. Henderson stated. For oats the support rate is 83 cents per bushel, which would figure out approximately \$2.50 per cwt. Both crops will be supported by loans that can be applied for through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in the Tower Theater building. Information also can be secured at the ASC office for type of storage required for grain in order to be eligible for the loan, and financing may be secured on an 80 per cent basis.

Studebakers Take Honors In Mobilgas Economy Run

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (U)—Three Studebakers took top place for each class in which they were entered in the 1954 Mobilgas economy run Thursday and one of them—a land cruiser equipped with standard transmission and overdrive— nabbed the event's choicest prize, the sweepstakes. Winners in seven classes and the sweepstakes were announced by officials of the American Automobile Assn. which supervises the annual economy test. Awards were presented to winning drivers Thursday morning, less than 24 hours after the 20 cars competing ended their 1,335-mile run from Los Angeles.

The run took an average of 32 hours, 45 minutes. The 20 drivers, all of whom finished the run, encountered city traffic, mountain driving and had to use chains to get through Donner Pass. The snow from the famed summit delayed the run at hour. Top awards were made on a ton-mile basis. Ton-miles are how many miles a gallon of gas will move a ton of automobile. The Studebaker Land Cruiser which won the sweepstakes scored a top ton-mile-per-gallon figure of 69.8463. It was entered by Paramount Motors, Inc., of San Francisco and driven by Dick Griffith. Actual gas mileage was 28.1046 miles per gallon. A Dodge Royal V8 was second in the sweepstakes division with a mark of 59.0456. A Studebaker Champion was fourth with 56.5138 and a Ford Mainline 6 was fourth with 55.5774.
