TOKYO (AP)—A Japanese physicist said Friday a uranium deposit found north of here "will yield enough uranium for an experimental atomic furnace."

The Rev. Graef spoke on "Music and Lutheran Worship," and described the theological basis for Lutheran worship and the implications this held for the place of music in the church.

"Music, whether presented by the organist or the choir, is subordinate to the worship; it is not to be thought of as a performance for the demonstration of the skills of the organist or choir," the Rev. Graef declared. He added that music merely lays the atmosphere for worship.

"In Lutheran worship this worship, or wedding of the spiritual and the aesthetic, reaches its culmination in the music of Johann Sebastian Bach," according to the speaker.

Mrs. Graef demonstrated these remarks on the organ, playing the "Chromatic Fugue" by Johann Pachelbel, "Prelude" by Fugue in B Flat Major" and "Jesu, Joy of Mans Desiring" by Bach and two Lutheran chorales, "Eln Feste Burg" and "Was frag' ich nach der Welt."

Refreshments were served after the program in the parsonage of Zion Lutheran.

The American Guild of Organists is a national organization for the improvement of music in the church. The local chapter was recently formed with Ernest Armstrong as dean; Eileen Herringshaw, vice-dean; Mrs. Richard Graef, secretary; Leo Zell, treasurer.

The group meets monthly at various churches where some phase of organ work is discussed. Future plans include bringing concert artists to Klamath Falls for recitals.

New members from the music staffs of the churches are welcome.

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Bootlegger Gets 6 Months

A "cash and carry" bootlegger

who supplied two high school students with a case of beer for a fee started serving six months in the county jail Thursday afternoon.

The beer vendor is Onnie Lamtella, 41, who admitted to District Judge D. E. Van Vactor that he charged the students a dollar for buying the beer for them. He was arrested by state liquor inspectors on information furnished by state

police.

One of the boys involved, Ronald Dale Larson, 18, was placed on probation for five months and was given a 20-day suspended jail sentence on a liquor and reckless driving charge. His companion who is 17 years old is held at the County Juvenile Home.

City police records show Lamtella had been arrested four times on drunkenness charges.

According to testimony given at Lamtella's hearing he was present in a tavern when a bartender refused to sell beer to the boys. He followed them out of the place. "Give me the cash and I'll get the beer," he told the students.

They complied and Lamtella went to another tavern where he brought a case of beer and carried it out to the boys' car. They paid him a dollar for the service.

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
