Soloists are Mrs. Earl Sheridan, soprano; the Rev. Wayne Proett, tenor; Carl Hagel, baritone. Accompanist is Francis Hamilton. The oratorio recalls the scenes which mark the last few days of the Saviour's life on earth and some of the reflections suggested thereby. The rejoicing of the multitude, the view of Jerusalem from the steep of Olivet, the lament over the city, the scene in the Temple,

the lonely walk back over the mountain at night form the chief features in the first part. Part 2 opens with the Supper of the Passover at which Jesus washes his disciples' feet, gives the new commandment of love. From this the scene passes to the infinite paths of the Garden of Gethsemane, the appearance of the hostile crowd, Jesus forsaken by His disciples, the tumult before Pilot, the passage of the Cross, the tragedy and triumph of Calvary. There is no admission charge, but a free-will offering will be taken for addition to a fund to purchase new choir robes. The public is invited.

The winners of the best and most unusual costumes were Sue Clark, Sharon Rutten and Monte Maris. The best home-room skit was put on by the 7-E section.

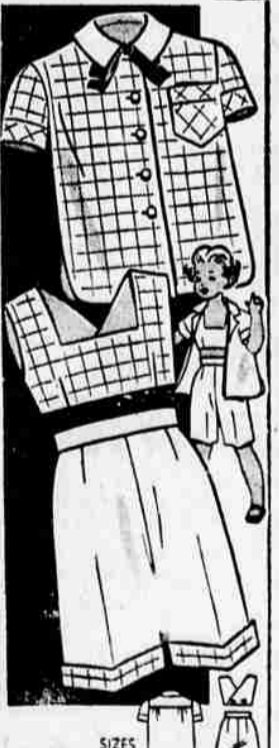
