An interesting report of the 40th annual conference of the Oregon Daughters was made by Mrs. E. M. Chilcote, delegate of Eulalona chapter. Of particular interest was the new slate of officers for the coming two years which includes Mrs. Albert H. Powers, regent; Mrs. Roy D. Armstrong, Portland, first vice regent; Mrs. Donald O. Hood, Medford, second vice regent; Mrs. James H. Harker, Ashland, chaplain; and Mrs. F. E. Epton, Portland, recording secretary. Both Mrs. Allan E. McLean, Portland, retiring regent, and Mrs. Powers will attend the Continental Congress of the National Society in Washington April 19, where at the final session Mrs. McLean will place the state regent's ribbon on her successor, Eulalona's delegate to the Continental Congress is Mrs. Roland E. Wright.

Mrs. R. E. Wattenburg, Mrs. Harry Goeller Sr., and Eva Burkhalter were appointed by the regent to secure candidates for Eulalona chapter for the coming year. Officers will be elected at the May meeting.

Mrs. E. M. Chilcote, using as her topic, "Women of Note," reviewed the lives of the three women who have won the Nobel Peace prize. Baroness von Suttner of Austria won it in 1905 for her "sincere peace acts." In 1931 Jane Addams shared the prize with Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, and Emily Green Balch was accorded that honor jointly with YMCA leader John R. Mott in 1946.

He later continued his studies in New York City with well known teachers; then was soloist at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in New York for ten years; and was soloist with oratorio societies throughout the United States and Canada. His background includes singing roles in opera, operettas, musical comedies and radio. He is now established as a voice teacher with classes in Roseburg and Eugene.

Exine M. Anderson, soprano, is assistant professor of voice at the University of Oregon. Prior to living in Eugene, she was a professional singer in New York City; doing radio work with Arturo Toscanini, Frank Black and the NBC Symphony. In Oregon she has been soloist with the University of Oregon Symphony, the Eugene Glee-men and the Eugene Civic Symphony. Miss Anderson holds a Master of Arts degree from Columbia University.

Stacy L. Green, accompanist, is also a member of the faculty of the University of Oregon school of music. Green received his doctorate in music at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York. He is now accompanist for the Eugene Glee-men, and is president of the Oregon Music Teachers Association.

Arthur Bailey will sing four tenor solos; Miss Anderson, four soprano solos; they will sing two duets; and Ruth Lobaugh and Mrs. Van Vector, will play a duo piano composition. Vocalists accompanied by Stacy Green.

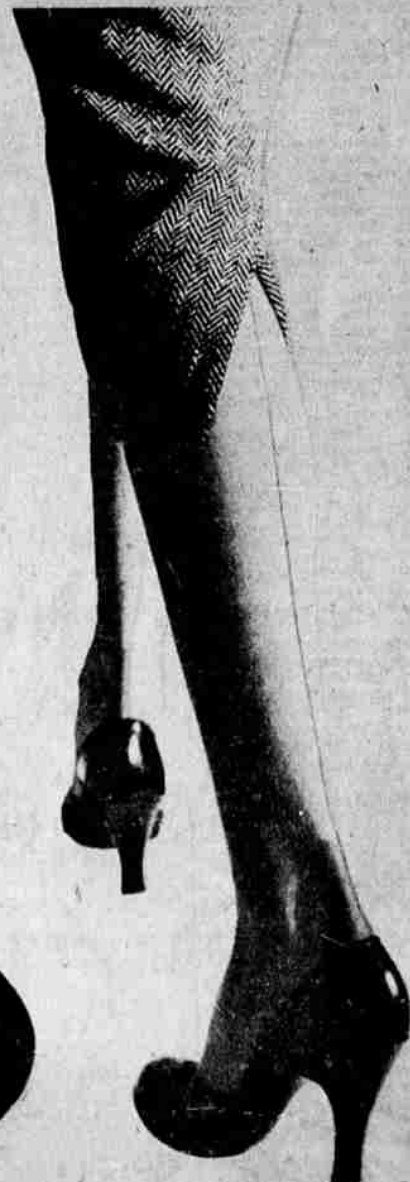
